Severe Accident.—David Williams, sixteen years of age, son of John Williams, of Evanston, met with a painful accident last Wednesday morning. He was engaged in herding goats on Bluff & Hay's ranch, north of that town, and on the morning stated he was handling a revolver, when the weapon was accidentally discharged, and the ball entered his right leg, about three inches above the ankle, and imbedded itself in the bone. The injury being of such a severe character it was considered probable that amputation of the limb would be necessary.

Oregon Short Line R. R.—Concerning the road an exchange publishes the following:

From Granger it is 140 miles to Soda Springs, upon which the grade has been completed, 82 miles of track laid and many of the bridges put in place. From Soda Springs to Pocatello, where the line crosses the Utah & Northern, it is 65 miles, making a total of 215 miles from Granger. On this gap between Soda Springs and Pocatello, graders are now at work, and already a portion is completed. West of the Utah & Northern the track is laid 16 miles and in about three weeks will be completed to a checkerboard line, six miles further. The track west of the Utah & Northern is laid with broad gauge ties and rails placed to accommodate narrow gauge rolling stock, and when the line is completed from Granger to Pocatello, the track westward will be widened to standard gauge.

IN MEMORIAM.

We have already made mention of the death, on the 10th inst., at Logan, Cache County, of Elder John Parry, Master Mason of the Logan Temple. We are enabled to present some details relative to the life of this most excellent and much respected man. He was the son of John Parry and Mary Williams, and was born at Newmarket, North Wales, on the 13th of October, 1817. He was one of a family of seven children. In his youth he had a few years of schooling; but at the age of twelve years was placed in charge of some sheep and cows, belonging to his father. A few years afterwards he went with his father, learning the trade of a mason. He soon acquired considerable skill in his labor, and at the age of nineteen years he took contracts for building, which he fulfilled very successfully. In the year 1844 he learned from one of his friends that Joseph and Hyrum Smith were killed. He had heard false reports about Joseph Smith and the "Mormons" before this, and was somewhat prejudiced against them. As soon as the news was told him of Joseph Smith's death, something whispered to him, "He was a servant of God." He heard but little about the Latter-day Saints until he removed to Birkenhead, in 1846. While living there he visited Liverpool and was invited to go and hear some Latter-day Saint Elders preach. He attended two of their meetings, one in the daytime and one in the evening. At the close of the evening meeting he and his father handed in their names for baptism. On the 12th of September, 1846, he and his parents were baptized into the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, by Elder Thomas Wilson. He was ordained an Elder about the 7th of October of the same year, by Apostle John Taylor. In March, 1847, he was called upon to preside over a branch of the Church at Birkenhead. After he was ordained an Elder, he spent his time in working at his trade for support, and traveling through Wales to preach the Gospel, and organize branches of the Church. Many times in his labors he was mobbed, and once or twice barely escaped with his life.

On the 24th of December, 1853, he was married to Harriet Julia Roberts, and in the beginning of the year 1855, after laboring in the ministry nearly ten years, was released to emigrate to Utah.

He embarked at Liverpool on the 19th of April, crossed the Plains in a handcart company, and arrived in Salt Lake Valley on the 3d of October, 1856. He settled in Salt Lake City.

In the fall of 1857 he was ordained a member of the 37th Quorum of Seventies. He was called upon a mission to Great Britain in April, 1858. He labored faithfully upon this mission until released to return home, after an absence of four years.

After returning home he worked at his trade in Salt Lake City and adjacent places until the 7th of August, 1877, when he was called to take charge of the mason work on the Logan Temple. He accordingly removed with his family to that place. He superintended the building of the Temple until his death, which occurred at 12 m. on the 10th of May, 1882. He passed away peacefully without a struggle, surrounded by his family.

On the 1st of August, 1880, he was appointed to preside over the High Priests Quorum of the Cache Stake of Zion. Since he joined the Church he has been true to his covenants and labored faithfully for the building up of the Kingdom of God. He was a kind and indulgent husband, father and friend. In his disposition he was quiet and unassuming, and was never known to find fault or complain, but when called upon to do anything cheerfully obeyed without any questions. He was a truly excellent man; and by his departure society is deprived of an honest citizen, a true Saint and a generous, kind-hearted friend. He loved his relatives and friends, and in return was beloved by all who knew him. He leaves a wife and five children. At the time of his death he was sixty-four years, seven months and three days old.

The funeral services over his remains were held in the Logan Tabernacle on the 19th inst., upon which occasion about 2,000 persons were present. Addresses were delivered by Apostle Moses Thatcher, President William B. Preston, and Elders Elias Morris and C. O. Card. Millennial Star please copy.

DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR, General Land Office, Washington, D. C., May 12, '82.

To Receivers of Public Money:

Gentlemen—Having come into possession of information that large numbers of fraudulent certificates, purporting to be issued at various United States depositories, for moneys alleged to have been deposited to cover cost of surveys, are provided for by section 2401, 2402, and 2403 (as amended by the Act of March 3, 1879) of the Revised Statutes of the United States, have been issued and put upon the market, rendering it possible for innocent parties to be defrauded in their purchase, you will cause the people in your respective districts to be advised of the existence of these fraudulent certificates, and request that all holders of certificates of deposit send them to this office for the purpose of examination and verification; said certificates to be returned to them without delay, with the certificate of this office as to their genuineness attached.

You are directed to post a copy of this circular in your office, and to take such other steps as you may deem necessary, to disseminate the information without incurring the expense of publication in newspapers.
