## OCDEN-LUCIN CELEBRATION

Grand Affair Scheduled for Monday, March 17-Will be General Holiday.

#### Motion Calendar in District Court-First Ward Entertainment-Mad Dog Creates Excitement.

A meeting of the committee appointed to arrange for a grand celebration of the commencement work on the Ogden-Lucin cut-off, which work has been commenced, was held yesterday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the city hall. There was a large attendance and much enthusiasim prevailed. Rev. P. M. Cushuanan was chosen

as chairman of the meeting, and V. unnell as secretary. After a short address on the purpose of the meeting' by chairman the following resolution was presented by Judge V. C. Gunnell and unanimously adopted: "ist. Resolved, That proper special committees be appointed with author-

ity to push the proposition for holding a celebration at the earliest day possiand. That all busings houses, cor-

porations and people, including farm-ets, are requested to make the day a holday; that all working people may participate in the exercises of the day, "3rd. That the main feature of the day's ceremonies should be a monster parade, not so much of floats or ex-hibits by merchanis, etc., but to especially draw out from their places of abor a vast company of employes, and other laborers, but to include all organizations, civic, military, social and usiness societies; schoolteachers from ty and county and pupils; citizens of ogden and Weber county, mounted, in hicles and on foot.

4th. That the rising sun on that day should be greeted liwth the booming annon, (presaging a booming city) screaming whistles, and ringing bells, and a repetition of the same at 12 o'clock, noon, and the day's proceedings close with speaking to begin at 3 o'clock from a stand to be erected on the city hall square or from some suita.

Considerable discussion followed as the date when the celebration should be held, and Monday, March 17th, was inally decided upon, which date will mark one of the grandest celebrations that has ever occurred in Ogden. On motion of Mrs. Georgina Mar-
