

THE IRISH HOME RULE.

Be Reason Why the Irish Members and the English Liberals Should not Work Together.

PROFESSOR KOCH'S REPORT CRITICIZED IN FRANCE.

Reduction Disappearance of Mr. Garfield and a Large Sum of Money.

By Telegram to the NEWS: THE HOME RULE QUESTION.

Written Note to be an Obstacle to His Honor's Views.

LONDON, Jan. 16.—Timothy Healy telegraphed to Dr. William O'Brien of saying that his father-in-law or his family, had received Harry or himself in an unusual manner while in Paris. Healy says O'Brien's relatives are particularly fond of Harry and himself were warmly welcomed and O'Brien was as determined as ever of the Parnell leadership as ever.

But Dr. G. G. Quinn, Parnell's closest friend, while addressing the meeting at Liverpool, said he was perfectly satisfied with the treatment of O'Brien. Quinn says that the confidential accounts of the Cologne conference were furnished by Parnell and Healy. The Doctor said: "The English Home Rule party, despite their skillfully playing, O'Brien has done all he can to destroy the English Liberal confidence and is, himself, the greatest obstacle to the successful issue of our cause."

"If the Irish people and the Irish members of Parliament continue to maintain their attitude of hostility to the English, they will stand no honorable confidence, which will be destroyed before Parnell left there is no reason why they should not, with respect for each other's independence, work together. The efforts of the English party with the spirit of equal assistance of mutual success. If their efforts towards us remain the same, our position towards them will be unchanged. Their attitude will be the same as the future of home rule is secure, nothing will happen to cause demands for separation, even hostility to England or not honorable alliance. The Irish people have a right, however, to have their independence and ought to have no chance."

FROM PARIS.

Koch's Report Criticized by French Physicians.

PARIS, Jan. 16.—La Lanterne today announces that the French government has not yet decided to support the Koch scheme.

French physicians criticize Professor Koch's report upon the ingredients of the typhus. They say it is impossible to determine the exact cause of the mystery. They hold that the necessity for isolation is unshaken. French critics also say that no patient treated according to the Koch system in France recovered.

Further experiments are needed to form a final opinion can be formed as to the merits of the typhus. Meanwhile the French physicians urge the treatment neither be decided nor evacuated.

No Conclusion Arrived At.

PARIS, Jan. 16.—The members of the Executive Committee of the French Red Cross Society had a conference with the officials of the road today, but it is understood that no conclusion was arrived at.

MURDERER'S ADVENTURE.

A Wealthy Frenchman Proves to His Family That He Is Safe.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Jan. 16.—Two weeks ago Joseph Gordon, Frenchman, came here accompanied by Louis Lamberth. They engaged rooms in a boarding house kept by Mrs. Lester, who said that Gordon had recently come into possession of a large sum left by his father, who died in Denver. Lester also said that Gordon had \$10,000 in cash, and some valuable effects worth \$10,000. Mrs. Lester said he was a handsome young fellow who says that several days ago Gordon proposed to her and Wednesday, as an evidence of his sincerity, gave her \$100.

Mrs. Lester looked the money in the chest of her room. Yesterday morning she learned that the money had been stolen. Gordon and Lamberth were both missing and no trace could be found. Mrs. Lester's theory is that Lambert had murdered Gordon and taken his place. Lambert told Mrs. Lester that his son, John, had \$20,000 in mining property and real estate. His name is Andrew Gordon. Lambert was employed by young Gordon as his traveling companion.

The Stock Market.

NEW YORK, Jan. 16.—The stock market this morning had none of its usual activity. The opening prices were irregular, but the market was generally confined to small transactions. The sugar refineries and Union Pacific were slightly higher, while the Missouri Pacific and Northern Pacific (preferential) 1 per cent. set of the market's fractional amounts. IN THE SENATE.
