result of careful preparation in good coaching. The game ended in a score of 17 to nothing, and the boys on the hill are now the recognized Inter-schol-astle champions of 1901. Although somewhat one-sided, the game was full of snap and ginger and the visitors lacked nothing in courage. The farmers would undoubledly have

PLAYERS USED FISTS.

Bitter Feeling Exhibited by Harvard and Pennsylvania Footballists.

Philadelphia, Nov. 9.-Harvard this afternoon on Franklin field admin-istered to the University of Pennsyl-vania one of the worst defeats she has experienced since she has been in the front rank in the football world. The The final score was: Harvard, .3; Pennsylvania, 6,

Harvard scored 22 points in the first and 11 points in the second half, while Pennsylvania scored 6 points in the urst half. This single touchdown was a gift of Marshall, Harvard's quarterback. Reynolds kicked the ball to Harvard's twenty-yard line. where Marshall fumbled it. Mitchell gathered it in and ran about twenty yards for a uchdown. After this Pennsylvania's chances of scoring could not be con-sidered seriously. Once they were near enough to marvard's goal to try a goal from placement, but the ball went wide of the mark. Pennsylvania's efforts to advance the

ball were really distressing. No better illustration is needed than the fact that during the first half the red and blue only gained four first downs, while Harvard gained twenty-seven. Only once during the entire seventy minutes did the Philadelphia eleven show anything like real football and this was in the first five minutes of play

During this period the ball was continuously in Harvard's territory, but this was due not so much to Pennsylvania's strength as to Harvard's fumb ling. The visitors were visibly affected with rattles during the first few min-utes of play, but when they struck their gait it was only a question of the proportions of the score.

In point of fumbling, both teams were about equal, but Pennsylvania was penalized three times to Harvard's once for offside.
