Lehi, Utah County, April 29.—Super-intendent Austin has just returned from Sanpete and Sevier counties and report of the beet planting in those districts is progressing nicely with the exception of Gunnison, and the farmers seem to entertain the idea that this crop can be attended to after all other The land in the northern part of Sanpete county is in excellent condition, and the farmers have taken great pains in getting it in good shape.
