NEW YORK, 31st

The Panama Star of the 22nd has been

received.

The Newbern had arrived at Panama

on the 18th, with 350 men, for the Pa-
cific Squadron. The Mohican leaves for

the north Pacific, about the first. The

Mohican, on her voyage to Panama, pick-
ed up the schooner Petrel from San
Francisco, with treasure-seekers bound
for the Looe Islands, in distress.

South American news is not import-
ant. The new volcano in East Leon,
Nicaragua, which has been in a violent
state of eruption from two craters, has
lately sent out a shower of fine black
sand, which reached Leon, twenty-four
miles distant, covering the streets to the
depth of half an inch.

London, 31.

Later advices from the Abyssinian

Expedition, say that King Theodore

has voluntarily released the English

captives.

Havana, 1.

Special advices from the City of Mexi-
co state that Congress is occupied with
the Constitutional reform proposed by
Government on the 13th. By the first,
the legislative power will be vested in
two houses; second, the President will
have the veto power subject to a two-
thirds majority; third, all communica-
tions between the Executive and legis-
lative branches will be held in writing,
either by message from the President,
or from a cabinet minister; fourth, a
definite number of the members of both
houses are to have the right to order an
extra session, fifth, is to provide who
shall be the President in case of the
death, resignation or removal of the
President, and Vice President.

Government troops are dispersing

bands of guerillas in all directions.

In Yucatan, matters bore a serious as-
pect. The rebels have reduced the gar-
rison of Meridia, and hold the capital.

An army of 3,000 men has been ordered

to Yucatan.

An order has been issued, banishing

all convicted of taking part in the late

war.

The Campeachy Indians who had a

misunderstanding with the English at

Balize have been defeated in several en-
gagements.

General Thomas W. Sherman is put

in command of the Eastern District, to
succeed Meade.

General Canby has called a conven-
tion in North Carolina to meet in Ra-
leigh on the 4th.

Montgomery, 2.

Of twenty-three nominations, made
by the late Republican Convention, all
but 11 have declined to be candidates.

Paris, 1.

Adelina Patti is to be married to the
Marquis De Cour, an officer of the Im-
perial household.

An official decree is published ap-
pointing the members of the Corps Leg-
islatif for the next five years, which is to
consist of 292 members.

Berlin, 1.

A petition against the annexation of
any of the West Indian Islands is re-
ceiving many signatures here.

St. Louis, 2.

The Republican publishes a list of the
casualties to steamboats on the western
waters for the last year, which shows
there were 128 accidents of all kinds, 82
of which resulted in the total destruction
of the boats, with a loss of property
amounting to \$640,000. 77 lives are
known to have been lost in these acci-
dents.

The first section of 30 miles of the
Lawrence and Galveston railroad is
opened for business. The road is being
rapidly pushed forward.

New York, 2.

Colonel Roberts has resigned the pre-
sidency of the Fenian brotherhood.

The senate had previously elected Gen.
John O'Neill vice-president in the place
of Joseph Gibbons, thus placing O'Neill
at the head of the brotherhood. Dis-
patches, endorsing O'Neill, have been
received from all parts of the country.

An address has been issued disclaiming,
in the name of the Fenian brotherhood,
all connection with the blowing up of
the Clerkenwell prison.

New Orleans, 2.

The convention has adopted as an ar-
ticle of the constitution, the forbidding
of the passage of a law regulating the
price of labor; also in prohibiting re-
ligious tests in the qualification for
office; also declaring the equality of all
persons in the right of travel in public
conveyances.
