## Our Country Contemporaries.

Ogden Junction, July 9—

Judge Emerson, of the First Judicial District of Utah, came to Ogden last evening, and this morning left for a two months' visit in Michigan.

On Wednesday night the westward bound passenger train ran into a herd of cattle near Kelton, killing three head. No damage occurred to either the train or the passengers.

In the suit entered by John H. Freeman, of Ogden Valley, against Messrs. Holmes, Ferrin, Odd and Berrett, for assaulting him with intent to kill, which has been under investigation the past two or three days, the defendants were discharged and the case dismissed, the Court considering the charge not sustained.
