The Marriage of Near Kin.

There is a widespread idea that consanguineous unions produce either defective offspring or none at all. When a marriage between cousins is spoken of, or a deaf-mute, idiotic, or deformed progeny is predicted, and examples are adduced to prove the truth of the prophecy.

Does this opinion rest upon positive and well authenticated facts, or is it erroneous? This is a question that was examined a few years ago by Mr. G. H. Darwin, who, after profound study of the subject, came to the conclusion that, in the present state of science, there is nothing to justify the common prejudice that exists against the marriage of near kin. More recently, the subject has been further examined by Mr. A. H. Huth, who has just published an extensive work upon it, in which he arrives at the same conclusions that Mr. Darwin did.

Mr. Huth thinks that consanguinity of itself plays no particular role in the union of individuals of the same stock. In the descendants, it increases the tendencies common to the two progenitors. By reason of their relationship, the closer the union, the greater is the tendency of the descendants to exhibit the same dispositions. If these are good, consanguineous unions are to be recommended; if they are bad, such unions should be avoided, in order to prevent a re-enforcement of unfavorable tendencies, which should be suppressed. But the case is identical whether it is a question of consanguineous or of non-consanguineous persons. No reasonable person would urge to nuptial individuals of different family to unite, because he knows that the nucleus has every chance to become intense in the descendants. On the contrary, a union between consanguineous individuals, equally healthy and well avowed, ought to be encouraged.

What may be urged against marriages of near kin is the facility with which unfavorable tendencies are transmitted, and the relative rarity of the circumstances in which such marriages can really be advised. But, this admitted and explained, consanguinity of itself presents no inconvenience, especially if we consider how remote, by reason of the existing laws upon marriage, is the degree of consanguinity between individuals capable of uniting legitimately.

Upon the whole, consanguinity accumulates and intensifies tendencies. If these are bad, when her first prime minister, Lord Melbourne, resigned, Sir Robert Peel was sent for. On his arrival at St. James, Sir Robert proceeded to explain to the queen the reasons for his resignation, and demanded certain changes to be made in her majesty's household. This the queen pre-emptorily refused to submit to, and Sir Robert, asking why he was sent for, her majesty replied that it was done without her consent, and that she wanted no Tory ministry.

A few years ago, Gladstone was also subjected to a mark of royal disfavor, but the Grand Old Man promptly returned a Roland for her Oliver. In conversing with the queen in relation to a matter of state, the then prime minister used the word "must" in referring to what should be her majesty's conduct in the matter.

"Sir," exclaimed the queen indignantly, "do you know who I am? I am the queen of England!"

"Your majesty," replied Mr. Gladstone quickly, "do you know who I am? I am the people of England!"

But if her majesty showed scanty courtesy to the new German emperor in the person of his envoys, it must not be forgotten that William II himself showed still less courtesy to a queen the other day in expelling her peremptorily from his dominions. Kings and queens might learn a lesson in good manners from republicans.—Once a Week.
