New Officers Chosen at Yesterday Afternoon's Meeting.

It was reported that since the tunnel was started last Sep-tember it has been driven 700 feet, and it has 400 feet yet to run to con-nect with the shaft and the main ore bodies. A half dozen fissures have been cut in the tunnel and one of them car-ries 12 inches of ore which gives neve-age values of 76.4 per cent lead, 40 ounces in silver and 2 per cent copper. The shaft, which is on the contact vein, between lime and quartite, is down 300 feet and the bottom is all in ore. The vein has not been opened on that level, but from the 200-foot level were made shipments of ore that aver-age 65 ounces in silver, 25 per cent lead, \$3 in gold and 2 per cent copper. As the values showed steady improve-ment with depth the management is confident that it will have a big mine on the lower levels. Work in the shaft was abandoned, pending the completion of the tunnel, because of the presence of water and the difficulty of getting supplies to the mouth of the shaft and fulding the ore down. UTAH AMATRICE. Mining Journal Makes Editorial Men-

tion of Gem Stone.

The Engineering and Mining Journal of May 30 makes editorial mention of amatrice, the Utah gem stone, deposits of which exist in Tooele county. The polished products of the mine referred to in the Journal article have been dis-played for some time and they have been universally admired by thousands. The Journal says:

been universally admired by thousands. The Journal says: "Amatrice is a precious stone, which is being produced and cut and polished by the Occidental Gem Corporation, of Salt Lake City, Utah. The mine which is the source of the stones is situated in Tocele county, Utah. The commer-cial name of the stone, amatrice, which is euphonious and preposeesing, is de-rived from the word American to de-note that it is strictly an American stone, and from the word 'matrix.' "Mineralogically, the stone is a vari-ety of variscite, which is a hydrous phosphate of aluminum. According to Dana, this mineral species has a hard-ness of 4, vitreous luster, deep emer-ald green to bluish green color. The specimens of the stone from Utah, which we have seen have been decid-edly harder than stated by Dana, being able to scratch window glass rather easily. In appearance the stone re-sembles Chinese jade, but it is of a lighter green and is mottled with brown, having a very pleasing appear-ance.
