

REVOLUTION AT A STANDSTILL

Awaiting Result of Negotiations For Peace Between Guatemala and Salvador.

REVOLUTIONISTS FOR BARILLA

Deplore Any Action on Part of United States That Would Give Cabrera Strength.

Mexico City, July 17.—A number of minor chiefs of the Guatemalan revolution who made an invasion of the northern portion of that republic have arrived here and say all movements of the revolutionists in Guatemala are brought to a temporary standstill awaiting negotiations for peace between Salvador and Guatemala to be held on the American cruiser Mariabene. But the men most concerned in the revolution do not look for permanent peace between Salvador and Guatemala for several reasons, one being that the insurrectionary party in Guatemala, with sympathizers by thousands all over Central America, will not, it is believed, consider as final any terms which may prolong the power of President Cabrera. Were he eliminated and another man put at the head of Guatemalan affairs, the revolutionists would be content and would welcome suggestions from the presidents of both Mexico and the United States.

In this regard the revolutionists are almost unanimously for Gen. Barilla, now in this city, who was the first president of Guatemala to serve out his term and declined re-election, retiring to private life and accepting a minor office as a matter of public duty. Gen. Barilla declares his only ambition is to bring about a change of administration in Guatemala and to assist in carrying out a broad and liberal program. He has large estates in the department of San Marcos, where he is held in high esteem. All revolutionists deplore any action on the part of the United States government that would give strength to Cabrera's administration, and they point to his record as proof that he is incapable of retaining power longer in Guatemala.

They allege cruelties, executions, forced loans, and general despotism on the part of Cabrera. They claim that it will be proved that he plotted to overturn the administration of Regalado when that soldier was president of Salvador, and has long been a disturbing element in Central American politics.

Well informed people here believe that the safest plan for the United States is to ask for a complete change of government in Guatemala with proper recognition of Barilla, Toledo, Castillo and other leaders of the present revolt.

Salvador, it is stated, will never consent to making terms with Cabrera, her bitter enemy. Cabrera has manifested unexpected military strength, and this fact has somewhat puzzled the revolutionists, but they declare that the revolution will go on unless the United States government and Mexico can persuade Cabrera to step down and out.

There is likely to soon be another revolutionary movement begun in Guatemala, so, planting the present one.

Mexico continues her policy of strict neutrality, which exempts Cabrera from attacks from the north. Official circles here have received news today that the Salvadoran army and revolutionists under command of Gen. Toledo have the Guatemalan army surrounded at Jutiapan and can compel their surrender as the Guatemalans have lost their artillery to the revolutionists.

TWO PITCHED BATTLES

San Salvador, July 17.—Notwithstanding President Cabrera's agreement with the president of Mexico to cease fighting, pending peace negotiations in Central America, two sharp engagements have occurred in Salvador just across the Guatemalan border. One was at Patzún and the other at Matapan. The Salvadorans were victorious in both engagements. Within two hours after Cabrera agreed to suspend hostilities his troops attacked the Salvadoran army at Patzún, only to be defeated by the latter this morning. The fighting at Matapan occurred yesterday afternoon. Both Patzún and Matapan are objective points in the march of Santa Ana, the summer capital of Salvador.

Never in the history of any country has there been such a patriotic spirit shown as in Salvador at the present time. Rich and poor are united alike, as was shown in the engagement yesterday. In the battle column Adelberto Gutierrez, lost his life. He was a graduate of West Point and when the war broke out he enlisted with thousands of his countrymen. He was about 30 years old and worth a half million dollars in his own right. This is not the only case of rich men enlisting. There are members of almost every rich family in Salvador now at the front. Salvador is treating her prisoners with humanity while it is stated in the battle of Matapan yesterday a young man named Molina, of one of the best Salvadoran families, was killed by the Guatemalans after he had been wounded in the leg. He was shown no mercy and was carved to pieces by the Guatemalan soldiers.

WELLMAN EXPEDITION REACHES DANES ISLAND.

Digermulen, Lofoden Islands, Norway, July 17.—The steamer Frithjof, having on board the Wellman-Chicago Record-Herald Arctic expedition, reached Danes Island, Spitzbergen, July 5, and found the shore of Virgo bay already dotted with structures, including machine shops ready for work and the material in readiness to begin the construction of the giant balloon house. The place had the appearance of a new western town.

All the 24 members of the expedition are well. Mr. Wellman hopes to establish wireless communication with Hammerfest before the end of July.

A HORRIBLE MURDER.

Man Beaten on Head and Then Shot By a Deputy Sheriff.

Trinidad, Colo., July 17.—Pounded on the head with a revolver until he was unable to stand, and then held by the arms so that his body was a good target for the executioner, was the terrible way in which Louis Vianca met his death at Starkeville, Sunday morning, according to witnesses at the coroner's inquest today. Gus Sandoval and Doroteo Arguello testified to holding Vianca while Deputy Sheriff Romero deliberately shot him.

The preliminary examination will be held tomorrow. The entire community is grieved over the revolting tragedy.

TOMB OF CHARLEMAGNE.

It is Opened at the Request of Emperor William.

Aix la Chapelle, Prussia, July 17.—The sarcophagus of Charlemagne was opened today at Emperor William's wish and in the presence of high dignitaries of the Catholic church and provincial officials, for the purpose of examining two precious cloths. These and other relics were found to be in good condition. The elder of the two fabrics dates back to the second half of the tenth century, and contains figures of four elephants. The other is of the twelfth century. The fabrics will be taken to Berlin with Cardinal Fischer's permission by Prof. Lessing, director of the Royal Museum of Industrial Art, and will be photographed and then returned and replaced within the sarcophagus. Emperor William took a lively interest in having the cloths removed for examination.

CASTRO'S RETURN.

In Commemoration of 11 Pardons All State Prisoners.

Washington, July 17.—Advises received at the Venezuelan legation here confirm the fact that Gen. Castro, in commemoration of his resumption of the presidency, has pardoned all offenders sentenced by the state courts. The prisoners have been completely cleared. The advisers further state that the feeling of confidence which prevails at Caracas as a result of the recent events has been reflected in an appreciation of values of the Venezuelan outstanding bonds. These have all risen five to seven points. President Castro has not yet formed his new cabinet.

ITALIAN KILLED BY TRAIN.

Green River, July 14.—About 4 o'clock p. m. Frank Warren, an Italian laborer for the Denver & Rio Grande, was accidentally run over by a train and died two hours later. As near as can be learned the man was riding on the side of the car, and as he stepped off he was caught on a heap of coal and slid under the wheels, two cars passing over his legs and severing them both, one at the thigh and the other at the knee. He was dragged about 60 feet and was considerably bruised about the head and body. A coroner's jury is now being impaneled to investigate the cause. He was a well respected citizen of this city and has a wife in Italy. He has been in the employ of the Denver & Rio Grande company for several years.

STROMBOLI IN ERUPTION.

Polemo, July 17.—There was a violent eruption of Stromboli today, incandescent material being thrown to enormous heights and causing serious fires on the island. No deaths resulted from the eruption, which was attended by loud detonations. The phenomenon was similar to that which immediately preceded the disastrous earthquake at Calabria last autumn and therefore occasions great anxiety lest it be followed by a repetition of the calamity.

CANNED MEAT SCARE.

Birmingham, England, July 17.—At a meeting of the Grocers' association today it was stated that the canned meat scare was having the most serious effect on trade in canned goods. Regret was expressed that the American firms who are now flooding the country with literature had not earlier placed their statement of facts before the public.

FIGHTING FOR THAW'S LIFE

Writ of Prohibition Issued Against District Attorney and Grand Jury.

MAY NOT TAKE ANY EVIDENCE

Plea of Insanity to be Worked For All That It is Worth.

New York, July 17.—John D. Gleason, one of Thaw's counsel, appeared before Justice Blanchard in part 2 of the supreme court today and secured a writ of prohibition restraining the district attorney and the grand jury from taking any evidence as to the killing of Stanford White. The writ, which is temporary, also restrains the district attorney and grand jury from issuing any subpoenas in connection with the matter of the killing of White.

Justice Blanchard also issued an order directing the district attorney and the grand jury to show cause tomorrow morning why they should not be absolutely restrained from any further proceedings in the matter of the killing of White and against Harry K. Thaw.

The allegations on which the restraining writ was issued state that as Thaw has been indicted by the grand jury, it is alleged, for the district attorney to issue grand jury subpoenas and to obtain further evidence for the prosecution through witnesses who appear at the district attorney's office in answer to the subpoenas. The application for the writ contained the following allegations:

"For the purpose of preparing the case for trial, subpoenas are made by the district attorney, addressed to witnesses requiring them to appear and testify before the grand jury in an investigation before it. These subpoenas are not made for the purpose of procuring evidence, but for the purpose of procuring evidence to be used against the defendant at the trial. The witnesses are required by the district attorney to be sworn as before the grand jury, and the depositions are taken. The newspapers keep track of the witnesses thus produced and endeavor to state the facts to which they have testified. The taking of these depositions against the defendant has been chiefly entrusted to Assist. Dist. Atty. Carvan, and from time to time interviews published purporting to come from him have appeared in the public press in which the intent to take the depositions before the grand jury for use against Harry K. Thaw at his trial has been plainly stated."

Mr. Gleason served a copy of the order upon acting Dist. Atty. Smith, who said that probably the district attorney would ask for an adjournment tomorrow, when the application is returnable in the supreme court. After his visit to the Tombs today Mrs. Harry K. Thaw went to the office of William K. Olcott, the lawyer who had previously acted as Thaw's counsel, but who was dismissed a few days ago by Thaw.

One report concerning the watch set upon Thaw was to the effect that the supposed "trustee" who is said to be watching the prisoner is an expert alienist who has been admitted to the prison by direction of Dist. Atty. Jerome. This report also declares that the purpose of the espionage is to ascertain whether or not Thaw is sane. Mrs. Harry K. Thaw paid her daily visit to her husband in the Tombs prison today. She said she did not know whether or not Thaw's mother, Mrs. William Thaw, will visit her son again today.

Thaw also had a consultation with his counsel, Clifford W. Hartridge and his partner. It was reported today that Thaw has been watched constantly since his arrest by a trusted prisoner who has been detailed as an extra watchman on the tier where Thaw's cell is located. One purpose of the surveillance is said to be to catch as much as possible of what is said at his talks with his visitors. It is not known who set the watch upon him as the prison warden refuses to discuss the subject.

The warden tomorrow will say: "Harry Thaw will never be placed on trial for the murder of Stanford White. An application will be made for the appointment of a commission to inquire into his sanity. There is no doubt that he will be declared insane and sent to the hospital for the criminal insane at Matteawan."

"This authoritative statement was made to the World last night immediately after the conclusion of a conference at the Hotel Touraine by one who had been present. At this conference, which began shortly after 5 o'clock, were Mrs. William Thaw, mother of Harry Thaw, Lewis L. DeLafayette, her personal counsel; William M. K. Olcott of the firm of Black, Olcott, Gruber & Boyning, young Thaw's former counsel; Josiah Thaw and Geo. L. Carnegie, son and son-in-law of Mrs. William Thaw. Mrs. Evelyn Negbi Thaw was present but took no part in the conference.

Mrs. William Thaw met Judge Olcott and insisted upon resuming the defense of her son, which she said he could do in any manner he saw fit. Mr. Olcott promised to take the matter under advisement, but said he could give no final answer until he had conferred with the other members of his firm. The statement is that the firm will again take up the direction of the defense of Harry Thaw.

"Mr. Olcott gave Mrs. Thaw information he had collected which convinced her that her son was mentally irresponsible on the night he killed White. He said that a number of the greatest alienists in the country who had been retained by the defense were convinced that the young man was irrational.

"Dist. Atty. Jerome is not expected to interpose any serious objection to the appointment of a commission to inquire into Harry Thaw's sanity. Some of the alienists retained by the district attorney have reported to him their belief that Thaw is mentally irresponsible. Many friends of Stanford White have asked the district attorney to consent to such a disposition of the case rather than have the notoriety of a trial."

STOLEN GOLD RECOVERED.

Seattle, Wash., July 17.—A special to the Times from Fort Bibbon, Alaska, says: "The box of gold stolen from the steamer Ida May has been found in the woods in the vicinity of town by Northern Commercial Agent W. C. Rodman. It was found to be intact and nothing missing. The box is undamaged. Superintendent Charles of the express company had offered \$500

reward for the recovery of the gold on his arrival at Gibbon. Many are under suspicion but no arrests yet.

BRITISH INVESTIGATING SAN FRANCISCO DISASTER.

San Francisco, July 17.—Ruger Owen, manager of the Commercial Union insurance company of London, who came here a few days ago with other British agents to investigate the local situation, was today:

"We are here investigating, to go into the circumstances and merits of all cases. They are not all alike by any means. Of course the earthquake cause is the stickler.

"If you ask me personally and individually whether the earthquake cause applies to our losses in San Francisco, I would tell you that it does so apply, but officially we can't speak at the time, because we haven't all the facts. Of course if we can prove that the first in the city were caused by earthquake, then, we are advised, we are not liable for the losses.

"There is also an equity involved for the widows and children shareholders who look to the companies for their dividends, and, of course, we have their interests at heart, also. The directors are acting in the position of trustees. They have no power to act beyond their contract. They have more right to cheat the shareholders out of their interests or property than has any one in the United States to confiscate private property without due process of law."

"We propose fair treatment for all, no preferences, no fish of one kind and fowl of the other; what we can do, we will do. What we can't do, we can't do, even if we would do it. Of course it should be remembered that there is a clause in our policies that this company is not liable at all for losses occasioned directly or indirectly by invasion or earthquake, insurrection, riot, etc. We expect to be here several weeks and our decision will be announced by publication as soon as we reach it."

The payment of \$500,000 or \$1,000,000 depends upon the decision of the British agents.
