The U. & N. Accident.

For the last three days the trains on the Utah & Northern Railway have been delayed owing to an accident on the line in Idaho. The Butte Miner has the following special dispatch giving an account of the trouble:

Melrose, August 10.—About 5 o'clock this afternoon a shocking wreck occurred on the Utah and Northern at the same place where the wreck occurred on Monday night. At that time the track was so completely torn up that a temporary track was laid round it. This, of course was anything but strong. At the hour mentioned freight train No. 611, northbound, was passing over this temporary track, and, the rails spreading, a number of cars with valuable freight were piled in inextricable confusion on the track. Several of them were overturned into the river, and it is a mystery how any of the train hands escaped with their lives. The south-bound passenger train that left Butte this morning is now delayed north of the wreck, and will have to wait till the north-bound train due in Butte at 8 to-morrow morning arrives on the south side of the wreck, when a transfer will be effected.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

GALVESTON, August 13.—A special to the News from Eagle Pass says: The town is greatly excited over the report that Governor Ross has signed papers for the extradition of Garza, the editor of the *Commercial Mexicano*. It is believed here if he should be turned over to the Mexican authorities he would not live twenty-four hours. He has incurred the enmity of Governor Galan, of Coahuila, through some articles published in his paper criticizing the governor's administration. Two attempts have been made to assassinate Garza, one of the men being hired by Galan, the other an emissary of Mandragon, who is well known in connection with the Aransas affair.

Chicago, August 13.—The *Inter Ocean's* Forest, Illinois, special says: Your correspondent has found a number of men at Piper City who positively contradict the testimony of Timothy Coughlan, the section boss, that he and his gang put out all the fires along the track before they left their work on Monday. These men were of a party which went from Piper City to the wreck on a handcar. They say, as they passed along the track east of the wreck, they saw fire burning in the hedges and the grass all the way along. The best evidences obtainable is that the fire built by the section hands was within 100 rods of the burned bridge when it was left. There is a general sentiment among the residents here that the section men were largely to blame. Very few people, except the officials of the road, give any credence to the lucidatory theory. There was not nearly as much robbing at the wreck as at first supposed. Watches and rings thought to have been stolen are being found among the debris as it is cleared away.

NEBRASKA CITY, Neb., Aug. 13.—The report has just reached this town of another feudish attempt at train wrecking on the B. & M. road at a place ten miles west. Last night as a passenger train was crossing the trestle bridge across a deep ravine the woodwork was discovered to be on fire. An investigation disclosed the fact that the stringers and braces were entirely consumed and the bridge in a shaky condition. The fact that the train was an unusually light one prevented a fearful catastrophe. Detectives are working up the matter.

LONDON, Aug. 13.—Matthews, home secretary, has refused to interfere in the case of the Jew Lipski, and the solicitor of the condemned man has consequently sent a telegram to the Queen imploring her to grant a respite.

DENVER, Col., August 13.—The situation near Meeker, where the renegade White River Utes, headed by old Colorado, are reported as having taken the war path, remains the same as far as can be ascertained. No news has been received from the scene of the trouble since last night. Adjutant-General West arrived at Glenwood to-night. He will look over the ground in the morning and report to Governor Adams later in the day. Governor Adams has received no word from Washington yet informing him what action will be taken. He, however, received a telegram from General Ray, commandant of the post at Omaha, inquiring the nearest railway point to where the Indians are now supposed to be camped. Captain Gaslin and a company of state militia composed of sixty men, arrived at Glenwood from Aspen this evening, where they joined the adjutant-general.

SAN FRANCISCO, August 14.—ASTOR A. Sargent, ex-United States Senator for California, died here this morning. He had been ailing for some time, but was confined to his house only the last two weeks. His disease was enlargement of the spleen in blood-poisoning. After his last return he engaged in law practice, establishing the firm of Sargent & Stone.

DENVER, August 14.—A Glenwood Springs special says: Senator Eddy, who returned to-day from a fishing trip to White River, last night met a party of sixty bucks who were evidently trying to join Colorado. This will increase Colorado's band to about 120 warriors. Colorado has also sent a courier to his brother at Uncomaghere agency, asking for assistance, and probably 50 or 60 bucks will be sent. One rumor says that Colorado has become frightened and has left his women and children behind, making endeavors to reach the Uintah agency.

IN UTAH, but the fact that no courier has reached Glenwood Springs since Friday leads the people to believe that the redskins are holding the road between these points, making it extremely dangerous to go over these roads even at night. There is considerable apprehension for settlers at Meeker who failed to reach town before this trouble began. Governor Adams shipped tonight 132 stands of arms and 600 rounds of ammunition to Glenwood and has ordered a company of militia to report there immediately from Leadville. This will make 120 blue coats stationed at this point ready for active service. Couriers were sent out from Glenwood this morning to learn the situation. They are expected to return to-morrow.

TIRNOVA, Aug. 11.—Prince Ferdinand was enthusiastically welcomed on his arrival here on Saturday night. To-day he attended a *te deum* in the cathedral. With a brilliant military and official escort he proceeded to the hall to greet the Sobranje. The Sobranje was in session, and when the Prince entered he was greeted with prolonged cheering. The metropolitan delivered an address and administered the oath to the Prince, who thereupon signed the constitution. M. Stollhoff, prime minister, on behalf of the Prince read a

PROCLAMATION SAYING: "Ferdinand, by the grace of God and the will of the people, Prince of Bulgaria, announces to our well beloved people that we assume the government of the country. We will rule in accordance with the constitution, with the intent to promote its glory, greatness and development. We shall always be ready to sacrifice our life for its happiness."

The Prince thanked the people for his election and the selection of regents and ministers for their safe conduct of affairs during the difficult crisis; pays a tribute to the patriotism and bravery of the people during recent events and concludes: "Long live free and independent Bulgaria."

MEXICO, Mo., August 14.—Ann Bransker (colored) left her two children, five years and ten months old respectively, in an eight by ten room closely shut up yesterday, while she went to a neighbor's house to spend the day. At night, when the room was opened, a horrible sight presented itself. The older child was almost suffocated and the younger one was in the throes of death. A portion of the flesh of the breast and stomach had been eaten away by the older child, who was almost starved. The mother is under arrest, as the younger child will die.

NEW YORK, August 14.—At a meeting of the Central Labor Union this afternoon, the food producers' section reported that they had adopted resolutions denouncing the county committee of the labor party for expelling socialists. Chairman McKim refused to allow this report to be read; this created much confusion, but the chair was finally upheld. The picnic committee then reported that Governor Hill had been invited to visit the union parade on September 5th. At once there was hissing and amid groans the proposition to invite the governor was laid on the table. During the rest of the session there was a continual conflict between the conservatives and socialists and the meeting broke up in great disorder.

LONDON, August 14.—The death is announced at Constantinople of Behram Agha, the Sultan's chief eunuch and confidential adviser, who virtually directed the state affairs of Turkey.

LONDON, August 14.—The Post's dispatch from Madrid asserts that General Salaminica declines to fight a duel with the correspondent by whom he was challenged, and that the general will start for Cuba on the 25th inst.
