LIME MAN'S TERRIFIC FALL.

David M. Smith Has Narrow Escape From Death While Repairing Line.

Little Harry Smurthwaite Succumbs to Injuries—Son of P. C. Koerner Falls From Building.

David M. Smith, another of the Utah Light & Power company's employees, following the same kind of work as the one who was killed, met with very serious injuries yesterday evening at Ogden, by falling from a wire, striking on the side of the head, right arm and back. He was sent to repair a line and was out of order near the corner of Madison avenue and Twenty-fourth street. He climbed a pole and then, while trying to get down, he lost his grip and fell. He was lying on the wires, when he gave away and fell, when he struck a distance of about eighteen feet, striking the ground on his right arm and back, fracturing the bones in arm and back, and seriously bruising his head. His back was also hurt and it is feared may have received internal injuries.

He was taken to his home at 2435 Quincey avenue and Dr. H. J. Powers was summoned and gave every possible relief to the sufferer. While it is not possible that his injuries will prove fatal, it will be some weeks before Mr. Smith will be able to resume his work.

LITTLE HARRY SMURTHWAITE IS DEAD.

The home of Mr. and Mrs. Harry C. Smurthwaite, 526 Twenty-third street, was visited by the angel of death yesterday afternoon at about 4:30 o'clock, and the spirit of the little son, Harry C., was called to his spirit world. The little boy was but four years of age, and was a very serious accident. He was playing on the roof of the house, and fell from the edge, being severely injured. He was taken to the hospital, but died before he could be removed.

LITTLE BOY HURT.

Yesterday afternoon the little four-year-old son of P. C. Koerner, who resides at the Morton terrace, fell from the building to the ground, severely cutting and bruising his face and body. Dr. Rich was summoned and dressed the wounds from which the little fellow will soon recover.

UNIQUE CELEBRATION.

Pioneer Day Vividly Portrayed by Living Pictures of the Past.

Heber City, Wasatch Co., July 24.—Pioneer day was ushered in by the firing of cannon and small arms. At 9 a. m. Stake house bell rang to call the people together. A committee had been making preparations to represent the "Pioneers of 47" and the settlement of this valley in 1853. Log cabins were erected. Groups of Pioneers, Indian scouts and Mormon battalion leaders were arranged, and two representatives each from all nations where the Gospel has been preached, also two "Mormon" missionaries lecturing. The hand cart companies were also represented. A short address was given on each group, the speaker telling how the people suffered hardships in building up a new country, having to eat thick roots and green of different descriptions to sustain life through critical and grasshopper wars. This was very interesting to the young people, being a new departure from our usual history lessons. There were quite a number of natives present, both old and young.

The groups were scattered over the court house block, and people had gathered in front of all over the county to witness the unique celebration.

In the afternoon the Sunday school children were given a dance in Turner's opera house. The day ended up with a grand ball in the same hall.

OLD TIME CELEBRATION.

Fairfield, Utah County, July 24.—Fairfield with its 148 inhabitants was celebrating the 47th anniversary of Pioneer day yesterday. After the usual preliminaries it started with a parade at 10 a. m., consisting of an advance guard

the southwestern valleys, and peach plums are ripening.

Hay and Grain: Harvest of timothy and wild hay made rapid progress in the northern sections, and the crop is above the average. In the south-western districts the second crop of alfalfa is being harvested, and, except in some localities where water is failing, is better than the first cutting.

Spring grain has ripened rapidly under the influence of warm weather. Owing to continued drought and hot winds, the outlook for "dry farm" grain is less promising than ever, and some of the crop will not be harvested.

Vegetables: Potatoes and garden vegetables have done well in most localities of the western portion of the state, but in the eastern counties have shared in the damaging effects of the drought; in some localities being almost a failure. In most sections potatoes are being dug in sufficient quantities for immediate use.

Stock: In all parts of the state the ranges are drying, and in some extreme eastern localities stock is being fed. In other sections there is still sufficient feed for present needs, and, as a rule, stock is in excellent condition.

PARKER, IDAHO.

Haying Nearly Over—Snake River Very Low.

Parker, Fremont County, Idaho, July 22.—The temperature here is from 90 to 95 degrees in the shade. Haying is almost over. We have had exceptionally fine weather for curing and hauling hay this year. No rain and very little wind. The crop is better than was anticipated. The North Fork of Snake river has never been so low before since the settlement of the country. One more large canal would take all the water that passes this place.

AT THE RESORTS.

Saltair's crowd yesterday broke into the bathing record of the best resort.

The record was not only broken into, but the bathers were in the water had they had the opportunity. There were over 6,000 excursionists carried to the beach during the day and when evening came everybody wanted to bathe. They kept the bathhouse all occupied continuously and clamored for more. Good order and behavior prevailed except in a couple of instances, when half-developed girls were promptly nipped by the officers. In view of the continuous increasing bathing patronage at the beach, there is under consideration a project to add a number of bathrooms to the present ones. Highway and water day are effective in prompting such a move.

Lagoon was one of the favorites for public patronage yesterday, especially for family parties. Not only did Salt Lake pour its thousands into the pretty garden resort, but Davis and Weber people were there in very respectable force, the latter being attracted by the baseball game between their invincible Ogden team and the Lagoon nine. Nearly 5,000 people were there and in all the crowd there was not a hint of disturbance during all the day.

Calder's park held a very orderly crowd yesterday, especially so when the size of it is considered. There were estimated to have been 6,000 visitors to the farm resort during the day, the horse races attracting them during the day and the fireworks bringing the people out at night. Howard and Western vaudeville played to good attendance and the merry-go-round was loaded with the little chaps from morning till late at night. Howard and Western orchestra played the old people and the lads and lassies in their teens.

Between six and seven thousand pleasure seekers retreated upon the Salt Palace yesterday to get away from the heat of the buildings and pavements up town. The bicycle races were splendidly patronized and it was found necessary to give two performances at the theater in the evening. Quiet good nature prevailed, everybody seeming to be

thoroughly satisfied with the treatment awarded them. A big crowd is expected again tonight after the grand parade of employees.
