UNIQUE CELEBRATION.

Pioneer Day Vividly Portrayed by Living Pictures of the Past.

Special Correspondence.

Heber City, Wasatch Co., July 24 .-Pioneer day was ushered in by the firing of cannon and small arms. At 9 a. m. Stake house bell rang to call the people together. A committee had been making preparations to represent the Pioneers of '47 and the settlement of this valley in 1859. Log cabins were erected. Groups of Pioneers, Indian scouts and "Mormon" battalion boys were arranged, and two representatives each from all nations where the Gospel has been preached, also two "Mormon" missionaries lecturing.
