An ordinance amending and re-enacting section 386 of Chapter XXVII of the Re-ised Ordinances of Salt Lake City, 7ab. *

The ordinances of sait Lake City, Stah. " Be it ordained by the City Council of Sait Lake City, Utah: Section 1. That Section 386 of Chapter take City, Utah, be and the same here-by is amended and re-enacted so as to read as folows: Section 386 Licenses for peddling or bawking in the manner and under the re-strictions described in Section 385, of Chapter xxvil of the Revised Ordinances of Sait Lake City, may be issued on the myment of the following sums per an-upn:

payment of the following sums per an-num: For a license to peddle or hawk vege-tables, garden produce, truit, butter, eggs, poultry, fish and game, for each wagon or stand, each wagon or stand to have a separate license, \$50.00. For a license to peddle or hawk mer-chandlese and other property not above enumerated, medicine excepted for each wagon or stand, each wagon or stand to have a separate license, \$80.00. For a license to peddle any baker's produce, for each wagon and stand, \$15.00. Por a license to peddle vegetables only from hampers carried by the peddlers where no wagon is engaged therewith, \$20.00. Provided that nothing herein shall be

- where no wagon is engaged therewith, 1000. Provided that nothing herein shall be deemed to apply to persons offering for sale butter, eggs, fruit, or vegetables raised or produced by themselves. No license shall be issued to peddie or hawk any medicines, nostrum or remedy of any character or description. No license shall be issued for a less term than three months. Only one person may peddle with each wagon, but each wagon may be accom-penied by one driver or one attendant in addition to the peddler, but such driver or attendant shall not peiddle. Each license shall be numbered, and said license. together with the number thereof shall be attached in a prominent place on said wagon. In case a wagon is used, and in all cases the person ped-ding under said license shall wear on his hat in a conspicuous place, while pedding, a metal tag exhibiting the same number as his license.
