SWEDEN.

The government has allowed the day-dag to grant an appropriation of \$2,000,000 kroner for the building of railroads.

The population in northern Daf is still decreasing because of the large emigration to the United States.

Two large wood pulp factories will be built at opposite ends of the Helsingfors river.

During the past year people emigrated from Sweden to America, as compared with 25,000 in 1893.

John Thompson, Swedish-American, who returned to Stockholm the other day, was found to be invalid, and was taken to an asylum.

Large numbers of Siberian wolves are said to have immigrated to southern Sweden from the eastern northern part of Russia.

The government will ask the reader to grant an appropriation for mounting the expense of an industrial exposition to be held in Stockholm in May.

Swedish physicians, manufactured by M. Ericsson & Co., of Stockholm, are in large numbers here to attend to Yokohama, Bombay and Madras.

Ex-minister Carl Edvardsson has been elected member of the House of the People by the Social Democratic Delegation speaker in the Lower house.

Crown Princess Victoria, who has a warmer climate, is a very sick woman. Information as to the true condition of the princess is, of course, not given to the public, but it is a public secret that she is suffering from cancer.

The Working Home of Fabrik, founded by a ladies' society, is a benevolent institution on the model of the Swiss.

The Home, established in a house of its own, is maintained by a tax, among which are fixed annual contributions, the profits of the Associations of friendly Rotarians.

Preparations are being made for a large shooting tournament, which will take place in Stockholm this fall, and in which many of the high classes will participate. Such tournaments have been held since every year during the last ten decades, but this one announced for next fall will be held on a larger and grander scale than ever before.

There are at present in Sweden a great number of associations for protection of Creeds to Animals.

The object of these societies is, to effect a kinder treatment of the domestic animals and also to impress the growing generation with interest in animals and to make them care for them.

The societies have also been utilized to introduce improvements in the mode of killing, and, to gain this object, special instructive courses on new methods have been given free of charge, and a great number of papers on this same subject have been distributed.

Veterinary surgery is supported by the Swedish Veterinary Society, which largely is situated in Stockholm, and to the appointment of a veterinary surgeon in each province. The provinces are divided into several districts, each one with a district veterinary surgeon, who is put in charge of the district by the Provincial Council. The agricultural societies chiefly have themselves with the development of those branches of live stock breeding of vital importance to each separate province, and consequently work in the direction of agriculture. This is effected by the purchase and sale of breeds, suitable for the provinces, by contributions to prize competitions, by the arrangement of smaller district meetings, exhibitions of taxed cattle, horse fairs and exhibitions of dairy products, etc.
