
A PLEASANT GATHERING.

James Leatham, one of the wel known veterans of the community, cele brated his seventy-eighth birthday on Tuesday last, Dec. 15. Mr. Leathan has been a resident of Utah since Oct. 5, 1853, during which time his home has been in the Sixth ward of this city. He took an active part in the move ments incident to pioneer life, assisting in the construction of the Salt Lake theater, the old White Bridge over the Jordan river, which has recently been demolished: the tabernacle and Assem heen bly hall, and was employed 18 years in the erection of the Salt Lake temple. He was a public school teacher in the early seventies, and drove the "Kitchen Wagon" in the annual tours of Presi-dent Brigham Young through the southern counties. For several years before the completion of the temple, he was the sole official guide for tourists visiting the temple block, and in that canacity distributed a year amount of capacity distributed a vast amount of literature and verbal information con-cerning the Latter-day Saints. His life has been characterized by unwavering zeal and devotion to the great work of the latter days, from the time that as a how of 19 ha labored as a missionary boy of 19 he labored as a missionary in his native land of Scotland until now, when at close to four score years of age he is found still in the harness laboring in the presidency of the high priest quorum of the Pioneer stake of Zion, performing the duties of a home missionary and other labors

LAW MAY UPSET PLAN.

Shall the teachers of Utah receive pay for attending the teachers' institute to be held this year December 21, 22 and 23? The question is one with which the board of education is strug-gling and on which it hopes to some to a decision at a special meeting whose date is yet to be announced. At the same time the question of paying the teachers for the New Year and Christines holidays will be taken up. On this question no definite conclusion has yet been reached, as there seems to be a hitch in the law which may throw a legal technicality in the way of such payments. Neither day, it seems, is listed as belonging to the school year.
