## WEATHER CONDITIONS.

The barometer continues above the normal, except over the Pacific states, and southern plateau region where the pressure is lowest; the crest of the high barometer being over Kansas. No precipitation was reported except over the north Pacific and central Gulf coasts, in Kansas and in Minnesota. Clear weather was the rule except along the middle and north Pacific coasts. The temperature has fallen to 40 degrees over portions of Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Illinois, New Mexico and Montana, with slight changes elsewhere. The lowest temperature was 24 degrees below zero in Northern Montana and freezing temperature extending nearly to the Gulf coast. Fair weather with rising temperature is indicated for this vicinity.

## LOCAL BRIEFS.

The Shoemakers' Union meets tomorrow night, in Labor hall, to elect officers.

Miss Edna Haynes was successfully operated upon yesterday afternoon for appendicitis at the Holy Cross hospital.

Arthur Vincent, the feeble minded youth, was taken to the insane asylum last evening by Deputy Sheriff Andrew Smith.

D. J. Gallacher's trunk store has been attached in a suit by Fowler & Elder to recover on a note. Mr. Gallacher says the store will not be reopened.

Charles Mostyn Owen, the paid informer, leaves for Washington this evening, to testify before the senate committee on elections in the Snoot case.

The Scottish Rite Consistory of Masons is working the nineteenth to the thirtieth degrees today in Masonic hall, before a large number of visitors. The Consistory completes its labors tomorrow.

The insurance by the S. S. Walker estate of the rentals of the Atlas block to the amount of \$15,000, results in only a net loss to the estate for the discount of rentals by fire, of \$5,000, as the regular rentals amounted annually to \$20,000.

Peter D. Foster of Owenton, Ky., brother of Warren Foster of this city, is dead, and a recently received copy of the News-Herald of Owenton speaks of the deceased as the highest feeble. The cause of death was spinal meningitis.

A general election is being held today at the University for officers of the student body, with three tickets in the field. There is considerable excitement over the event, and there is considerable political work going on. Care is being taken to prevent ballot box stuffing.

The report that orders had been issued by the Utah Fuel people or the Rio Grande to hold coal at Ogden, consigned to the Southern Pacific, is denied. The Rio Grande and coal officials state that if there is any delay it is because the Southern Pacific people are not ready for the cars.

The Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen gave one of the largest balls of the season last night, in Christensen's hall. There was a locomotive headlight on the orchestra platform, there were red, white and green semaphore lights, and a miniature freight train was in evidence. The merry makers spent a very pleasant evening.

The state university architect reports two buildings at Ogden as practically ready for occupancy. The roof is being put on the third structure, which will be ready Feb. 1. He reports Cedar City as pretty well wrought over the prospects of the advent of railroads, and that the municipality is preparing to put in waterworks.

Engineer McCartney of the San Pedro returned last evening from California, where he left the Harris machine all put together and ready for operation. He expects to lay about a mile a day, and may go a little faster on a pinch. He has a good laugh for the morning paper that referred to the machine as an "automatic tracklaying machine operated by 24 men."

An interesting reception was given last evening, at the residence of Mrs. Nellie Latta in honor of Dr. Kelsey of the American Institute of Archaeology. Many of the most prominent educators of the city were present. The professor spoke during the evening, on the work

accomplished by the Institute in American, European and Asiatic fields. He lectures this evening in Barrett hall on Recent Discoveries at Pompeii. A special organ recital will be given at 5:30 this afternoon, in the Tabernacle by Prof. McClellan in honor of the visiting savant.

Dan's Review for the last week has the following survey of business conditions in Salt Lake. Conditions in jobbing lines continue about as reported last week. Sorting orders in dry goods, clothing and notions are fairly good and aggregate a fair volume of business. Wet weather and snow stimulates the demand for shoes and rubber goods. Trade is steady in groceries, drugs and hardware. Weather conditions also improve some retail lines. Collections still drag and are unfavorably affected by rainy weather. Money is in fair supply, with a good demand at strong rates.
