

YALE TEAM SHORT ON GOOD KICKERS

That Important Department May
Not Be Very Strong.

NOW WORKING ON LINE-UP

Some of Last Year's Players Will Be
On the Eleven This Year—
Many Candidates.

According to the accounts that come from the east old Yale will be sadly in need of material for her football team this season. Capt. George B. Chadwick is again on the field as is Ralph J. Bloomer, the star tackle of two seasons ago.

Harold Miller, a promising halfback last fall, will fill a backfield position. James Shevlin, the 185-pound tackle, will also be one of the strong men of the team. Raftery may be tried behind the line where he played two weeks last fall very creditably. Holt will play center and Knopf, the 250-pound freshman of last year's eleven will make a fair substitute. DeSaules and Wey-

tably weak, even more so than last season. One of the two Andover guards, Boucher and Kinney, is to take the position vacated by Olcott at left guard. Bloomer will make a good plunging fullback.

There are no doubt many candidates for positions on the team, and while some of them may be new to the business and would not prove of very much benefit to the team, still the team's manager should be able to score up enough good men to make up the right kind of a team.

Champion Young Corbett Will Have
A Busy Time This Winter.

Champion Young Corbett will be the busiest fighter in the country in the coming winter. He was recently matched to meet Joe Bernstein before Al Herford's wreck club at Baltimore on Oct. 9 for a \$3,000 purse. The men have agreed to weigh in at 128 pounds at 3 o'clock on the day of the contest. On Monday, Oct. 6, he is to meet Eddie Lenny at the Industrial club at Philadelphia, and a week later Dave Sullivan at the Penn club in the same city. He also signed articles with Bill Crowley at Hartford to meet any 128-pound man that Crowley may select. After which it will be time to again go into training for his match with McGovern. In speaking of his contests at the Metropole hotel Corbett said: "I am going to keep busier the coming year than I ever was in my life. I am ready to fight any man in my class and will try to fight at least once a week either in Philadelphia or Chicago, in which

places I have already signed for several matches. I will probably fight McGovern in San Francisco in December."
