## GUATEMALA DEFIDENT

Excitement and Fighting Still Prevail in Mexico.

## PROBLEMS OF CAMPAIGN.

Mexican Cabinet Meeting Today; After Which a Declaration of War is Expected.

CITY OF MEXICO, Jan. 25.—The Mexican cabinet will meet today at noon and a declaration of war will be issued. A meeting of the cabinet has been called to meet early this morning, at which time it is thought will be declared.

Mexico, it is said, has 10,000 men on the Guatemalan frontier ready for action.

### GUATEMALA'S KNOW-HEWS.

MEXICO CITY, Mex., Jan. 25.—The official communiqué of Guatemala to the demands of Mexico over the threatening international boundary dispute was delivered to the National (also this morning) by General José Coss, chief of staff, late last night, having been forwarded from Mexico City by telegraph, by the secretary of foreign affairs of the City of Mexico, who gave the government's full and frank recognition of the existing relations existing between the two nations, as follows:

"General:—Matters of some sort, and of the American newspaper press, respecting them, have been the subject of the intense interest. He has visited the *El Imparcial* office and has had no difficulty in obtaining the documents. The *Imparcial* will say nothing more than he has done, but the expression of his views has been fully justified in the *El Imparcial*, the *Noticias de Guatemala*, and the *Revista de Guatemala*, the former of which is a newspaper of Mexico.

Foreign Secretary Mariscal was engaged today in making a careful reading of the reply, which is very voluminous and covers many pages of correspondence with the Mexican government.

It is known that the government of Mexico will give the Mexican government a copy of the reply, and the government of Guatemala will do the same.

The statement of the Mexican government will be given at the meeting of the cabinet today. It is generally understood that the import of the reply is that the same as those in the much-revered note of the Mexican Minister of Foreign Affairs it was delivered to him by the Guatemalan government. ## MORE GOLD WITHDRAWN.

our First Million Dollars Expended  
For Shipping.

The situation very trying, but the  
Government's Credit Not  
Encouraged.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—The secretary of the treasury has authorized the issue of gold bars for export amounting to a premium of one per cent, to cover the cost of manufacture and transportation, and the amount of \$1,000,000 was taken on these terms. This was also withdrawn yesterday in coin, and a goodly number of gold bars were shipped up to a value of \$50,000. This leaves the gold reserve, \$20,000,000, and the amount of gold bars on hand where the amount of expending gold certificates is \$1,000,000.

Thus, in view of the amount of gold received on deposit certificates as carried in their redemption, but not expended, there will be no deficiency in the amount of gold available for export.
