BOARD CONTINUES INQUIRY.

Investigation of Tool Shortage Is Held By Teachers' Committee.

The investigating committee of the board of education held its second session yesterday afternoon in an effort to trace the missing tools from the manual training departments of the city schools. David Crockett Newman and Theodore M. Newman, who were accused of taking the tools, were exam-

ined before the board, but nothing conclusive was brought out against them. They admitted that they had worked under assumed names in order that they might draw their wages. This was done. It was explained, to avoid a judgment brought by Francis G. Lake in Murray, which was afterward held to be illegal.

Principal G. A. Eaton of the high school said in relation to R. A. Newman, who had been employed there as a janitor, that at first he was over-hauling, but since he became acquainted with the work his services were above the average. He said that the

carpenter work in the new gymnasium, which had been done by the Newman brothers was not up to the standard. Thomas J. Bridgwell, brother of Holding Supt. Bridgwell, told the board that he was a carpenter and produced letters of recommendation. He had been employed at odd jobs about the buildings and some complaints had been made about his work.

The investigating committee adjourned, after examining several other witnesses on matters of no importance, subject to the call of the chairman. Judge Henderson, Hammond, Thomas and Newman were present at the investigation.
