It Was Entered With the Reservation That it Might be Withdrawn.

DEFENSE EMOTIONALINSANITY

He Has Several Disagreeable Experiences With Prison Discipline.

Wanted to Walk at Midnight, Have Lauch and a Pair of Indian Clubs -All Refused.

New York, June 29.-Harry K. Thaw entered a formal plea of not guilty when arraigned on a charge of murder in the court of general sessions today. The plea was entered with a reservation that it may be withdrawn on Tuesday next,

While waiting for the opening of court. Thaw sat near an open window in the bridge of sighs which connects the prison with the criminal court building. He talked freely with newspaper men and others during his brief stay, but declined to say anything whatever concerning his case. He appeared to be in good physical condilon and said that he slept fairly well How do you find the beds?" Thaw

"Well," he replied, "they are not just what I've been used to, but I guess I'll get accustomed to them."

IN COURT.

Thaw was taken into Justice Cowing's court, where he was to plead to the murder charge behind three other persons, one of whom was a negro, charged with larceny. He was dressed n the same gray suit he wore yesterday, with a white shirt and collar and a black bow tie. His appearance was very little different from that of yesterday, except that he was slightly peler. He stood with his back to an open window at the north end of the open window at the north end of the courtroom and chatted to a court officer, while the other prisoners were being arraigned. When his case was kalled, Thaw stepped briskly to the harrier inside of which his counsel, ex-Judge Olcott and T. J. McManus, were string at a table with Acc. Die sitting at a table with Asst. PLEADS "NOT GUILTY."

The only careessness in the prisoner's make-up that was noticeable was the fact that his hair was ruffled as if it had not been
