

limited. The arches on the west doors are now turned, and the windows on the north and south are ready for the arches on the first floor. All hands are now upon the east end of the building and two arches are turned from the main entrances into the stairways. The Carpenters have been considerably delayed for the lack of timbers, the main timbers for the first floor being not yet on the ground, owing to the lack of teams to haul the same from Mt. Trumbull, and unless more teams can be procured said timbers will not be delivered here for some time to come. I may also state that quarry hands are also very limited, but hopes are brightening for a large supply of assistance in every department pertaining to the Temple, which we are all anxiously longing to see fulfilled.

Preparations are now making for the plastering of the Tabernacle, some of the scaffolding is already up, and the workmen are waiting for timbers to finish the balance. It is expected all will be ready to receive the plaster by the middle of October. The scarcity of hands all through this southern country and the amount of labor the few have to perform is a great drawback to the progress of public and private improvement.

President Gardner and Bishop Bunker returned from the north on the 4th, they having been appointed a delegation by the directors of the United Order to consult with President Young upon certain items pertaining to the practical working of the Order in this State of Zion. On Sunday, the 6th, they reported the result of said consultation in the public meeting, which was generally well received by the congregation, and from the feelings manifested by the majority there can be no doubt of the success of the Order amongst us, as the explanations seemingly gave every satisfaction.

Fruit drying is going on rapidly amongst the people, the weather being favorable for the same, and if it continues so a large amount of fruit will be secured. Our prospects for wine are still good and the wine producers are preparing to make the same, which will commence in about three weeks, with every indication of a large yield.

Scarlet fever is quite prevalent amongst the children at present. It was brought here from the north by some of our late emigrants. Some five or six have died of the same, but it is hoped the worst is past. President Snow arrived here on the evening of the 7th, his family having telegraphed to him that his son Erastus B. was very sick and afflicted with typhus fever, nigh unto death. He is slowly recovering, but very weak. This is the only case of typhus in the city. President Snow returns to-day to meet his company at Toquerville.

By special appointment there will be held a two days' meeting on the 12th and 13th. Our adjacent settlements have been notified of the same, when no doubt good practical instructions will be given by President Erastus Snow, and Elders George Q. Cannon and A. M. Musser.

#### Second District Court—Mining Trial—Fatal Fight with Witnesses.

BEAVER, Sept. 16th, 1874.

Editor Deseret News:

The district court has been occupied for the last three days over a mining suit, wherein Jos. Glasford et al were plaintiffs, and P. E. Connor et al defendants; judgment was rendered in favor of the defendants. James Hedges, one of the plaintiffs in the suit, and Thomas Golden, a witness for defendant, quarrelled in the afternoon, and at about 5 p.m., when Hedges was coming towards Mike Powers' saloon, Golden met him and, raising a double-barrelled shot gun, loaded with nire buck shot, fired the contents into Hedges' right shoulder as he was trying to dodge. Hedges staggered, and afterwards gathered himself, following Golden, and fired three shots from a revolver at him, two of which took effect, one on each side of the backbone, going through the kidney. Hedges turned to leave, when Golden fired another shot at Hedges, missing him. Golden died last night at 11 p.m. Hedges is in a critical condition, although it is believed that he will survive.

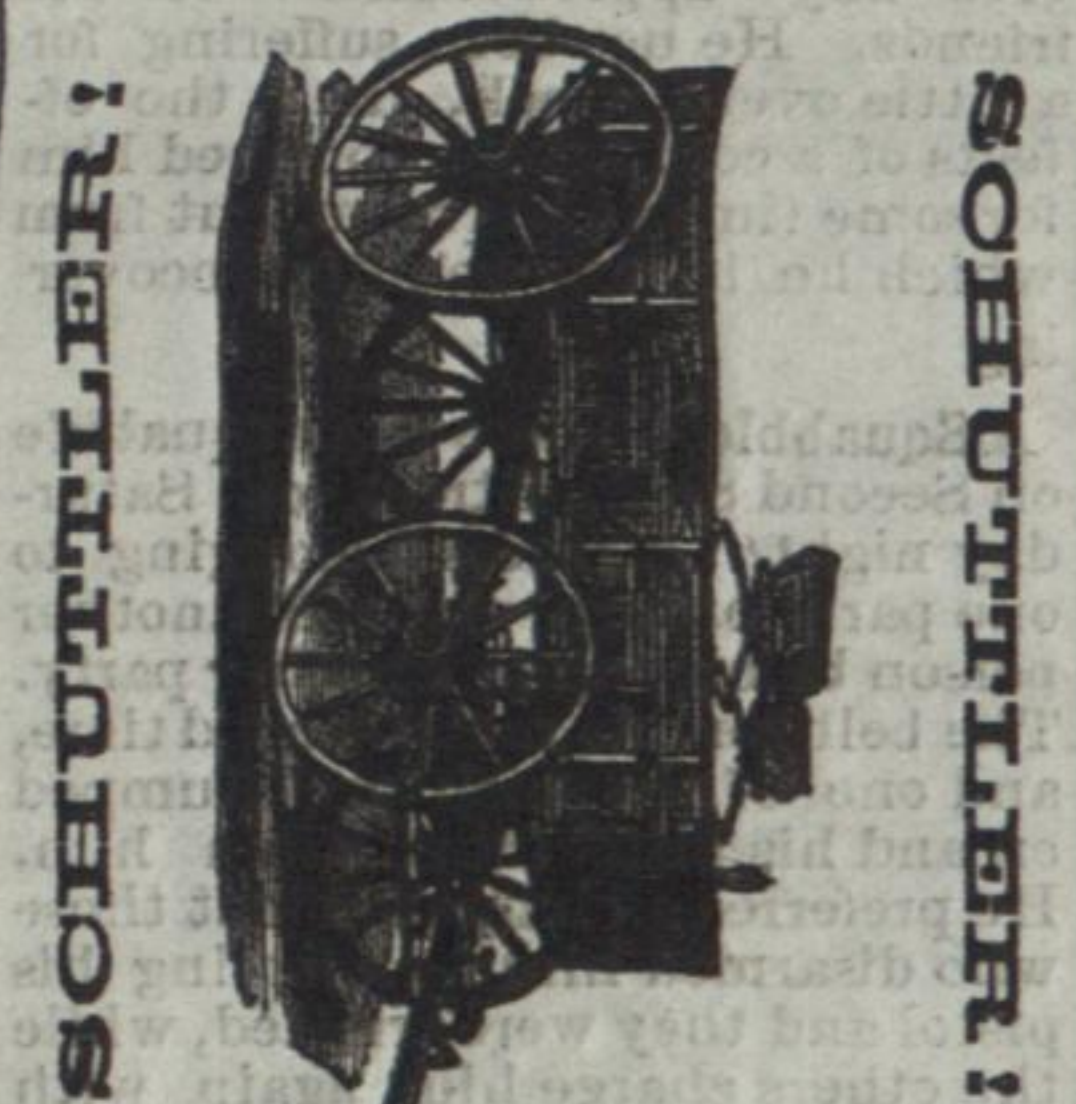
