**BY TELEGRAPH.**  
THE "BRISCO" ELECTION.

**SAN FRANCISCO, 30.**—At 12:30 o'clock the total vote cast was 18,855, or about 8,000 short of the vote at the same hour last election. At this rate less than 100,000 votes will be polled. Against the probability of a tight vote favoring the Workingmen is the fact that owing to the difference in the time of the election, the character of the ballot can be known as they lie in boxes and those who have been on the watch claim that the Citizens' Union ticket is ahead even in some strong Workingmen's precincts. There is much talk of scratching, though more or less being done. Thus far the election has been the quietest ever held in the city.

The total vote of the city, except two small outside precincts, is 10,000. Since noon the Workingmen's wards pulled in 10,000 votes, and at the edge of the city, where the Citizens' Union is uniformly 25 per cent. below the vote of last September. The tenth ward, a strong Workingmen's precinct, has been scratched, and the Citizens' Union is ahead. The twelfth, an equally strong Citizens' ward, runs a little over. There seems to be a general belief that the Citizens' Union has elected all the candidates, although the outlook is less favorable, reasoning from the totals of the various wards, than earlier in the day.

Much comment is excited by the variation noted in the ballot paper. It is known that men were stationed at the polling place during the day, to take note of the color of the ballots and the persons voting them, and the workingmen charge the Citizens' Union with a put up job to enable them to exercise surveillance over the voters in relation to the election law. One report is that an employee of the Secretary of State's office, and another that a member of the Citizens' Union, were stationed at the polling place, to take note of the color of the ballots and the persons voting them. There seems good grounds for a contest over the matter, and many hold that ballots not in accordance with the law can be thrown out, giving the election to the workingmen.

**Deadwood Items.**  
**DEADWOOD, 30.**—Andrew Wallace, a prominent citizen of Indianapolis and a heavy mine operator, was shot four times and probably fatally wounded to-day, at his residence at Poncha, near the city, by his son Hank, who has been delirious several days, the result of severe sickness.

**CHARLESTON'S ADVANTAGES.**  
The special committee of the Charleston Chamber of Commerce, appointed some weeks ago to consider the question of Western railroads, submitted an elaborate preliminary report to-day, exhibiting the advantages of Charleston as a port of entry and export for the trade of the Northwest States with Europe and the West Indies. Much stress is laid on the importance of the necessity for an additional line of railroad connecting the Northwestern railroad systems with the South Atlantic.

**AN ALMSHOUSE MURDER.**  
**PITTSBURGH, 30.**—It appears that the murder of John Goehring in the Alms House, which occurred on the 6th ult., was done by Colhoff, another well-known inmate, who became provoked at the resistance offered by Goehring when an attempt was made to remove him from a third inmate, Colhoff after kicking him terribly, beat him into insensibility with a rolling pin. He died shortly after and the affair was kept quiet until a drunken resident of the place told the story. The keeper Crawford and Colhoff have been arrested for the murder.

LACKAWANNA COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA, March 23, 1880.

Our miners are only employed three days of a week. All the necessities of life are advancing in price, and the miners are suffering. An advance in wages is promised on the 1st of April. However these advances do not better the condition of the laborer, for no sooner is the advance secured than it goes up the necessities of life, rents, etc., which make it oftentimes worse for the laborer than before. A few months ago there was an advance of ten per cent. given shortly after the miners were put on half time.
