WILD BOARS OF LERDO.

Roaming over the lands of the Lerdo colony, 78 miles south of Yuma, are droves of wild hogs, various estimates placing them at 100,000 in number. They are descendants of tame hogs placed on the range when Thomas H. Ryther was part owner, about 15 years ago. Mr. Ryther's descendants have given him full recognition of his right to the land, and he turned loose and allowed to go at will over the rich bottom lands of the Colorado River. A few generations transpired, and the descendants of the wild swine became so numerous that they would attack and eat a man if they had the opportunity. They subsisted chiefly on the wild potato, a tuber which grows the size of a wine bottle in the soil, with the seeds of the plant, and when the right spot is struck by them, the trap door falls and they are prisoners. The hogs are fed before being slaughtered. Their meat is fine, juicy, and fat, and the fat sweet and delicious.

Operations were begun about a year ago, and though not conducted on a large scale, have been successful. The hogs are caught in a circular corral about thirty feet in diameter, with a trap door in the side in the shape of ears and stakes are scattered about the entrance and also buried in the sand. A band of hogs are attracted by the bait, and the corral is closed, and the trap door is sprung, capturing the hogs, and when the right spot is struck by them, the trap door falls and they are prisoners. The hogs are fed before being slaughtered. Their meat is fine, juicy, and fat, and the fat sweet and delicious.
