MAY OPEN THE RESERVATION.

Nevadans After Walker River Indian Reserve for the Prospector and Miner.

IT CONTAINS GOOD MINERAL.

Country Said to Equal that Which is Creating Sensation in South Part of State.

Many of the state's most prominent citizens are bringing considerable pressure to bear upon the officials of the interior department at Washington to have the mineral land of the Walker River Indian reservation thrown open to prospectors, says the Carson News. The reservation is known to contain some rich mineral deposits and it is no uncommon thing to see Indians come down from the mountains with fine looking specimens of gold or copper ore in their possession.

Some white men have been on the reservation and have done enough prospecting to satisfy them that as a mineral region it has great possibilities. The stay of these men was generally cut short by the appearance of Indian police, who have authority to expel intruders. Recently the land department served notice on all prospectors that they would be prosecuted for trespass if they ventured on the lands in the future, and since the order was made those behind the movement to have the reservation thrown open have been very active. It is urged that the Indians make no use of the mineral lands without proper permits and make no attempt to develop mines. The opening of the agricultural lands of the reservation has not been asked for at the present time.

Capt. Tibbets, who is identified with the Mason Valley Copper company, which is composed largely of Salt Lake, while in Salt Lake recently said the opening of the reservation to prospectors and mining men would mean a great deal to the state of Nevada and he would not be surprised to see mines there that would equal, if not surpass, anything in the district farther south.

MORNING ON CHANGE.

Stocks Rule Strong and Business is Still Brisk.

Though trading on the exchange this morning was not as large in volume as yesterday yet the call was through all spirited one. In all 15,175 shares were dealt in, netting \$7,444,822. Carissa opened the ball selling 500 at 19 1/2. Daily-Judge followed with a sale at 35 1/2. Little Bell was the feature of the regular call and sold up to \$2.90 per share with \$2.92 asked at the close. Uncle Sam was strong at 40, while New York stood at the old figure of 19 1/2. Columbus, Conn. was strong on the open board, selling at about \$2.85, while Utah scored a sale at 19 1/2. Of the higher class stocks Silver King was offered at \$50. U. S. Mining at \$40.50, and Boston Con. at \$21.75 with \$20.50 bid. Grand Central was very strong receiving the highest bid of this month, \$3.10, but holders could not take less than \$3.40 for the stock.

COPPER STRIKE IN THE RED WING.

Body of Ore Opened in the Drift From the McCann Up-raise.

TWO FEET 6 PER CENT COPPER

Mine Looking Fine and 500 Tons Per Month is Taken Out While Developing.

A strike of large proportions can now be recorded in the Red Wing of Bingham. Manager W. C. Orem, who has been in the camp for several days, says that in a drift from McCann upraise in the old Red Wing ground, a chute of copper ore was broken into Monday. When first opened the body was two feet wide and was going down strong. This has been followed 15 feet along the bond of the vein and the body is constantly broadening. Manager Orem says that the mine in particular he is sure that a very large body of ore will be developed further on. The ore is mostly copper and assays 6 per cent in the red metal with between 25 and 30 ounces silver and gold. From shipments of ore of the same character taken from other portions of the mine he thinks that this average will be kept up throughout the chute. Speaking of the mine in particular he said that no ore was being broken that is not taken out in the way of development, but that he now was shipping to the mill an average of 500 tons a month.

ENLARGING ITS TERRITORY.

Southern Pacific Co. Increases Capital Stock and Adds Claims.

The papers increasing the capital stock of the Southern Pacific of North Ogden from \$600,000 to \$1,000,000 and the par value from 25 cents to 31 per share were filed at the office of the secretary of state yesterday. This action was taken for the purpose of increasing the territory of the company's holdings, which now contains 240 acres of Two common veins run through the ground for 3,000 feet, one of which is under development.

Manager Burnham, who reached this city from the mine last night, says that in the tunnel now being run on the big ledge, every shot breaks ore which is of higher grade than the last. The entire vein is ore in fact, and when it is understood that the ore bearing ledge is 40 feet wide, the proposition looks like a whale. Roads will be built during the winter or early spring and he says heavy shipments will be started. There are already many hundreds of tons on the dump.

LUCKY A. H. MAYNE.

Makes Another Sensational Strike in The Sandstorm Mine.

That lucky Salt Lake, A. H. Mayne, has another sensational strike in the Sandstorm of Goldfield. The whole face of the 30-foot level on lease No. 7 is filled with free gold and the body seems to be a very large one. Speaking of the strike, the Goldfield Sun says: "The 30-foot level of lease No. 7 has been the principal shipping drift on the Sandstorm, ore having been sacked there almost steadily for the last 12 months. The pay shoots like flat and has varied for value with progress. Yesterday's strike is one of the richest that has yet been made. Mr. Mayne states that most of the rock broken down will go more than \$1,000 per ton, while some of it will assay at figures that he is too modest to mention for fear they may sound fishy. "The best thing about the new strike," said Mr. Mayne, "is that while almost the entire face glistens with gold, the showing of the door of the drift is even better, and we do not know yet just how large a proposition we have struck, and will not know until the shoot is followed down."

BUYS A SMELTER.

Chas. M. Schwab the Steel Man Enters The Ore Reducing Trade.

The great steel magnate, Schwab, has invaded the smelter business by purchasing a smelter on San Francisco bay in Contra Costa county, California. The smelter has a capacity at the present time of 150 tons per day. It is to be enlarged at once, and be used for the handling of Tonopah ores, notably, those from the Tonopah Extension, of which property Mr. Schwab holds the control. The new smelter at Tonopah, which he is building, is now nearing completion, and is said to be one of the most up-to-date mills in the country.
