The princi-pal factor was the report of rain in Ar-gentha where harvesting has just com-menced. The unsettled condition in Rus-sta, however, had considerable influence. Small receipts in the northwest furnished additional incentives to buy wheat, May opened 4:0% to 5:0% higher at 574 to 89 and for a time held around the 55 mark. Minneapolis, Duluth and Chicago re-ported receipts of 593 cars against 567 a year ago Strong cables and the advance in wheat ereated bullish sentiment in the corn pit.
