aithfully drudges for them through ummer heat and wintry storm, and often seein to return affection in a way that is almost human. But the horse, not possessing vocal means of protesting against discomfort, is often subjected to torture from the thought less caprice of its masters. The over head check-rein and blinders are the nest common instruments. By the use of the check the head is held up so high and rigidly that the poor animal's eyes are of little use in avoiding obstruc-tions, and accidents are of frequent occurrence. The eyes are exposed to the full glare of the sun, which is both painful and permanently injurious. There is a constant and unnatural strain upon the muscles of the neck which must cause discomfort, the ex-tent of which can only be judged by anyone imaging timself the victim of such a contrivance. Is it not enough that the horse is required to draw a load at a rate of speed suiting the whim of the driver, without subjecting the muscles to a constant strain? The

added barbarity of blinders completes the misery of the horse. One who stands on a crowded thoroughfare can not fail to ob-serve the expressions of uneasiness and positive pain worn by horses with blinders. Their averaging attrained as blinders.
