

THE CRUSADERS AT WORK.

A METHODIST ANTI-MORMON MEETING. Yesterday having been set apart by the Methodist Churches in the United States for a united onslaught upon "Mormonism," the fragment of the belligerent sect in this city had a meeting last night devoted to the mild and Christian-like object of persecuting an unpopular but most excellent people. The lower part of body of the church, on 3rd South Street, was well filled. The central part was filled with a prominent audience, while a front left wing was occupied by leading men of the anti-"Mormon" movement, including Federal officers, among whom, as usual, Gen. M. E. Evans was conspicuous. The right wing was occupied by a large representation from the Chinese washhouses, but several of the Christians went out at an early stage of the proceedings.

Shot and Robbed.—This morning a man named John Johnson came down to the city in a light. He had been working on the Oregon Short Line Railroad in the north. On Saturday he and a companion were set upon by a number of men and robbed of all they had. In the struggle resulting from the attack, Johnson was shot in the leg, the ball breaking the bone. He came down, accompanied by the companion in trouble, for the purpose of going into one of the hospitals in this city for treatment.

Miniature Battle at Buhning's.—Yesterday afternoon, Enoch Ables (nephew) and four companions, drove down to Buhning's Gardens, on the Salt Road, and demanded drink. As they were already befuddled, Mr. Buhning refused to supply. They then became boisterous, when Ables was put out of the place, the proprietor using a club in the operation. Ables went to his wagon and got a pistol, with which he pummeled Mr. Buhning about the head, and also struck C. Craig, an assistant, on the plate, a side blow by way of variety. These reprehensible proceedings enraged Ables, who was arrested, and this morning, appropriately punished by fine.

Creation.—A resident of the 19th Ward called this morning and requested us to state that the people of that portion of the city are in favor of every laudable enterprise, but have a decided objection to the locality being transformed into a crematorium. Yesterday, at one of the lime kilns, a large quantity of old bones were burned. The north-west wind carried the smoke from this consuming mass of animal matter over the ward, creating an effluvia that caused the people to wonder whether they were breathing the clear air of the Rocky Mountain Region or the fossil atmosphere of a volcanic chamber house. Our informant stated that a repetition of the infernal business might lead the afflicted people to resort to revolutionary methods. A blast to the west would be sufficient, and cause a stoppage of the bone-burning business, unless some method of consuming the smoke can be applied.

President Taylor and Party.—President Taylor and party, who were at Logan, attending Conference reached Ogden this morning, and will arrive in the city this evening. The Conference was an excellent one. On Saturday morning, President W. B. Preston made a few introductory remarks and the Bishops reported the condition of the people as eminently satisfactory. The remainder of the time was occupied by a discourse from Elder O. W. Penrose.

The Conference was well attended, particularly yesterday, when the meetings were crowded to excess. During the whole of the afternoon and evening there was a continuous flow of rain.

There was an evident feeling of relief when this insipid individual concluded his rambling ravings.

MAJOR BRADLEY was the next man to mount the rostrum. As he spoke with a rapid and poor delivery, his energy being expended in flapping his hands about in the air, some of his remarks were partially inaudible, but it was no great loss. He had been in Utah, or connected with it in a business capacity, about 12 years. The "Mormons" had treated him with great kindness and fairness, without exception. He had nothing against them, but he was opposed to their damnable system. He admitted that the situation was fraught with gravity. "Mormonism" was a cunningly devised scheme, and had in it the elements of the greatest evil ever known traveling through the Territory once with Brigham Young, who was a man of extraordinary influence over men, he asked him whether he had seen all this development of country beforehand as a seer, or whether he had gone on step by step as other men. The answer of Mr. Young was "I am a creature of circumstances."

Governor (by title) of this Territory, was introduced as the first speaker. This officer of state, who thus identified himself with the cause, in a vindictive church for the accomplishment of a political or state object, and thus, in his own conduct declared the separation of the body-religion and the body-politic, mounted the rostrum with a majestic stride. His slow, methodical manner of speech, in such as makes men of active minds impatient because they perceive his objective point a long time before he reaches it. His remarks, boiled down, were in effect, that the unanimity of varied, including the Supreme Court, Congress, and popular sentiment, against polygamy was suggestive. In the face of this a man who practiced it was a knave, a fool or a fanatic. After this judgment it had been stated by the speaker that the "Mormon" Church, in presence of thousands of its devotees, that he had never violated any law which was constitutional. What would you think of such a man?
