**RUNNING ATHWART**  
**JAPAN'S POLICY**

**American and British Capitalists**  
**Negotiating With China to**  
**Build Railroads.**

**MAY MEAN COMPLICATIONS.**

Washington Officials Do Not Believe Japan Will Be Allowed to Interfere Without Protest.

Washington, Oct. 14.—American and British capitalists have about completed arrangements with the Chinese government to build a railroad from Chin Chow Fu through Mongolia territory to Tientsin, a distance of about 400 miles. This fact seems to have disturbed the tranquillity of Japan. It was said here today.

Published reports from Peking indicate that Japan has given China notice that it will maintain its right under the two treaties concluded last month, to be consulted with respect to Manchurian railways. Japan sees it as a serious decision with regard to subsequent action.

Among officials here it is regarded as doubtful if Japan will be permitted to interfere, without objection, in this or other enterprises in China or Manchuria in which Americans are interested.

The fact that an objection to the construction of the proposed Chin Chow Fu-Tientsin line is listed at Japan is regarded here as tending to support allegations of monopolistic inclinations on the part of Japan.

The proposed railroad through Mongolia will be about 400 miles in length to Tientsin, and if extended on to Amur its total length will approximate 600 miles. The fact that it will tap the Russian Trans-Siberian road at Tientsin is thought to explain the supposed animosity of Japan and Manchuria as the Chinese Eastern South Manchurian line taps the Siberian road at Harbin, the proposed line, because of its more direct route and shorter distance to the south, would be likely to become a strong competitor to the latter road, which is now controlled by Japan.

Government officials here regard Japan's opposition to the Hsinmintun-Peking line as retarding the development of China of a portion of her territory, and as in direct violation of article 4 of the treaty of Portsmouth, which states that "Japan and Russia reciprocally engage not to obstruct any general measures common to all countries which China may take for the development of commerce and industry in Manchuria."

**TWO KILLED SEVEN INJURED**  
**IN AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT**

San Francisco, Oct. 15.—Mrs. H. C. Edwards, wife of an Oakland dentist, and C. N. Anagnos, an Oakland cigar-maker, were killed, and seven others were injured, in an automobile accident in a suburb of Oakland last night.

Those injured were: Mrs. Howard Cameron, Hotel St. Mark, Oakland; H. O. Abbott, Mrs. Abbott, O. R. B. Leiby, an attorney, J. Anagnos, J. Knuckel, steward at the hotel St. Mark, and Henry Tieghner, chauffeur.

All the victims were in an automobile. They were going at a speed of 30 miles an hour. The car skidded on a curve and struck the curb. The machine struck a hydrant and turned turtle. Mrs. Edwards was thrown on her head and killed instantly. Anagnos died on the way to the hospital. Mrs. Edwards was a widow of six weeks.

**STRIKE LEADERS ARRESTED.**

Manila, Oct. 15.—Thirty-six leaders of the striking cigar-makers were arrested here today charged with criminal conspiracy.

This action is the result of the unauthorized cigar makers striking for higher wages after the Payne tariff bill went into effect. Several serious riots have taken place.

The complaint on which the leaders were arrested included a recitation of the alleged blood pact that was signed by the strikers.

This was an oath each was required to take stating that if they betrayed the cause their brothers had the right to kill them without responsibility to the authorities.

Davis protested his innocence, but he was recognized by the police as an old offender and was held for trial.

**FIRST WOMAN SUMMONED**  
**AS JUROR IN CALIFORNIA**

Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 15.—Los Angeles' first woman juror may find itself in the van of the suffragette movement next Monday when the name of Johanna Engelman of Santa Monica is called in connection with the superior court as the first woman juror ever summoned in California.

Mrs. Engelman is the widow of the captain of an Alaskan vessel. She is the mother of five grown sons and a daughter and is a taxpayer. Her name in some way got into the jury box and recently was drawn with others.

Mrs. Engelman is not a woman suffragist. She says her father was a state's attorney in Germany, and that she feels qualified to act as a juror. She believes, however, that women in general might prove too tender-hearted to administer justice in all cases. She is quoted as saying that she could not send a man to prison for stealing a hat of bread and would probably hesitate about voting to hang a man.

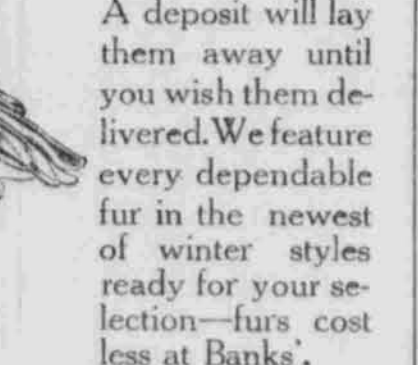
