### Y. M. M. I. A. CONVENTION.

Ralle, the man who was driven out of Mercur last week, for the reason that it was alleged that he had made some remarks approving of the murder of President McKinley, is now in this city where his home is and where his family has resided since they came to Utah about fourteen years ago. Mr. Ralle denies that he is an anarchist or approves of their doctrine, and denies that he made any such statement as he is charged with having made in Mercur, and claims to know nothing about the report of his anarchistic utterances till the mob visited him.

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## PAROWAN.

Witnesses for the Defense Say He Shot in Self Defense.

Parowan, Iron Co., Sept. 21.—In the trial of Glendenning, after the opening of the defense by Attorney King, the examination of witnesses for the defense was begun. The first witness called was M. C. Laybourne of Stirling. On the morning of the shooting he was passing Peak's saloon and overheard Hedges boasting that upon one occasion he had been fired for contempt in a court of justice, but that he pulled out his revolver and compelled the judge to adjourn court, and that since then he has been his best friend. Later, in passing the saloon, he heard Hedges calling some person a coward, and that he dared not bet. Shortly after he saw Hedges coming from his cabin with a revolver strapped on him, going toward the saloon door, and that Hedges opened the door of the saloon, at the same time having his hand on his revolver in the act of drawing. Witness then heard Hedges say: "Come out here, you the coward, don't fight in another man's house." Glendenning then came out of the door and grabbed Hedges by the right arm, and heard him say: "No you don't old man." Hedges then drew his gun and he heard five shots, when Hedges fell, still trying to pull his revolver.
