NO. DIVISION.

Two new items have been introduced, either adopted or there is not adaptation in the matter, in the movement against the Latter-day Saints. They are "Progressives" and "Conservatives." The attempt is made to divide the "Mormons" into two classes. Those who follow the "progressives" are those who follow the article in "Young Utah," given by the "Anti-Mormon" paper which aims in control of affairs, political and otherwise, in the state as it exists in 1890-91. Those who follow the "conservative" are people who desire to be guided by that sort of conduct and be directed by its direction, but cling to the principles which are the foundations of their faith.

As a matter of fact there are not, in all Utah, a sufficient number of the former class to be dignified with the title even of a faction. A few misguided young men and perhaps a few foolish older persons, may be influenced in the direction indicated. But there is no actual division among the "Mormons" save in the Anti-Mormon, and that, perhaps, is a little too pronounced in some particular.

Among the leading Church authorities the division almost has no real existence, outside of political party lines, in which every individual is perfectly free and in which there is not practical or theoretical unity. The idea sought to be conveyed, that some of them desire to restore former conditions as in plural marriages, and to establish political power and control, is without authority, foundation in facts. Nor could it be possible in any ecclesiastical system, *for any two or three Apostles or other influential Churchmen to change the policy of the First Presidency and of the body of the Church if they had the desire to do so; but there is no manifestation of any such desire on the part of any of them.*

We touch on this subject because of the endeavor that being put forth to create the impression that such a division exists in the Church, and there seems to be a disposition to certain quarters to make this subdivision between the Church as to certain issues, however absurd and groundless, may be true in whole or in part, and it is denied in an authoritative source.

The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints is unit on the doctrine, discipline and relation to the State and the Nation. There is no inclination at present to revert to the former condition which caused the contention and difficulty with the Federal government, and there is no scheme to interfere with the policies among those who have dissociated themselves from the First Presidency and Twelve are in harmony, and the great masses of members are with them, and will support them in their work for the spread of truth and the building up of the Church in all the world. The "Maine" has been remembered. The Spanish fleet has been held all but annihilated, and has been forced to withdraw to Havana. In her course she has won the admiration of less than ten countries. The hand of Providence has written one of the most wonderful chapters of history in the annals of mankind.

The best of it is, that our country can look back upon those pages with profound satisfaction. What partition, what dooms of hellism, what acts of generosity do they not contain!

Let the Maine still be remembered, and let the ranks of honor be an incentive to all who have been called to the service of God and man.

What opportunities for spreading civilization, and well and righteous liberty, are now so vast, that if they are exploited, this country may and the world onward toward the higher era of Millennial peace.
