where the enemy encounters no resistance, are too eloquent to need comment. Civilized Europe will pass the judgment which it deserves on this mode of carrying on war.

Hainau's bloody butcheries at the close of the Hungarian revolt of 1849 are yet fresh in the memory; but General Gyulai, now leading the Austrian forces, bids fair to even exceed Hainau in cruelty. The following, says the *Cleveland Plain Dealer*, has been published, and remains uncontradicted, as the text of a proclamation by this bloody General to the inhabitants of Placenza, though it is commented upon with great severity by the press in other parts of Europe:

A Provost Marshal's court is organized, and only applies one punishment—that of death.—The following are considered crimes incurring penalty:

1. High treason, or any act tending to forcibly change the system of the empire of Austria and of the duchies, or to attract or increase any danger from abroad against the said States.

2. The concealment of arms or ammunition of any kind. The public are particularly reminded that the punishment of death will be inflicted on any one, whatever his condition may be, or however irreproachable his previous conduct may have been, who shall be found in possession of arms or ammunition, either on his own person or in his house, or in any place to which he may be supposed to have access.

3. Taking part in assemblages whether armed or unarmed.

4. Illegal enlistments, acting as spy, seducing soldiers, whether they belong to the Austrians or allied troops, and generally all that may occasion disadvantage to the Austrians and advantage to the enemy.

5. Armed resistance or any aggression against sentinels or patrols, and the slightest violence against any Austrian or allied soldier. A warning is also given that the sentinels and patrols will not only have a right, but are ordered, to use their arms against any one who shall not yield at the first summons.

The following is the British declaration of neutrality:

BY THE QUEEN—A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA R.—Whereas we are happily at peace with all sovereigns, powers and states;

And whereas, notwithstanding our utmost exertions to preserve peace between the sovereign powers and states now at war, hostilities have unhappily commenced between his Imperial Majesty the Emperor of Austria on the one part, and his Majesty the King of Sardinia, and his Imperial Majesty the Emperor of the French, on the other part;

And whereas a state of war now exists between his Imperial Majesty the Emperor of Austria, on the one part, and his Majesty the King of Sardinia and his Imperial Majesty the Emperor of the French, on the other part, and between their respective subjects and others inhabiting within their countries, territories, or dominions;

And whereas we are on terms of friendship and amicable intercourse with all and each of the sovereigns and with their several subjects, and others, inhabiting within their countries, territories, or dominions;

And whereas great numbers of our loyal subjects reside and carry on commerce, and possess property and establishments, and enjoy various rights and privileges, within each of the dominions of each of the aforesaid sovereigns, protected by the faith of treaties between us and each of the aforesaid sovereigns;

And whereas we, being desirous of preserving to our subjects the blessings of peace, which they now happily enjoy, are firmly purposed and determined to abstain altogether from taking any part, either directly or indirectly, in the war now unhappily existing between the said sovereigns, their subjects and territories, and to remain at peace with, and to maintain a peaceful and friendly intercourse with all and with each of them, and their respective subjects, and others inhabiting within any of their countries, territories and dominions, and to maintain a strict and impartial neutrality in the said hostilities and war unhappily existing between them;

We, therefore, have thought fit, by and with the advice of our Privy Council, to issue this our Royal Proclamation;

And we do hereby strictly charge and command all our loving subjects to govern themselves accordingly, and to observe strictly a neutrality in and during the aforesaid hostilities and war, and to abstain from violating or contravening either the laws and statutes of the realm in this behalf, or the laws of nations in relation thereto, as they will answer to the contrary at their peril.

And whereas in and by a certain statute made and passed in the fifty-ninth year of his Majesty King George the Third, entitled, "An act to prevent the enlisting or engagement of his Majesty's subjects to serve in foreign service, and the fitting out or equipping in his Majesty's dominions vessels for warlike purposes without his Majesty's license," it is amongst other things declared and enacted as follows:

That if any person within any part of the United Kingdom, or in any part of his Majesty's dominions beyond the seas, shall, without the leave and license of his Majesty for that purpose first had and obtained as aforesaid, equip, furnish, fit out, or arm, or attempt or endeavor to equip, furnish, fit out, or arm, or procure to be equipped, furnished, fitted out, or armed, or shall, knowingly assist, or be concerned in the equipping, furnishing, fit-

ting out or arming of any ship or vessel with intent, or in order that such ship or vessel shall be employed in the service of any foreign prince, state or potentate, or of any foreign colony, province or part of any province or people, or of any person or persons exercising or assuming to exercise any powers of government in or over any foreign state, colony, province, or part of any province or people, as a transport or storeship, or with intent to cruise or commit hostilities against any prince, state or potentate, or against the subjects or citizens of any prince, state or potentate, or against the persons exercising, or assuming to exercise, the powers of government in any colony, province, or part of any province or country, or against the inhabitants of any foreign colony, province, or part of any province or country, with whom his Majesty shall not then be at war, or shall, within the United Kingdom, or any of his Majesty's dominions, or in any settlement, colony, territory, island, or place belonging or subject to his Majesty, issue or deliver any commission for any ship or vessel, to the intent that such ship or vessel shall be employed as aforesaid, every such person so offending shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall, upon conviction thereof, upon any information or indictment, be punished by fine and imprisonment, or either of them, at the discretion of the court, in which such offender shall be convicted; and every such ship or vessel, with the tackle, apparel and furniture, together with all the materials, arms, ammunition and stores, which may belong to or be on board of any such ship or vessel, shall be forfeited; and it shall be lawful for any officer of his Majesty's Customs or Excise, or any officer of his Majesty's navy, who is by law empowered to make seizures for any forfeiture incurred under any of the laws of customs or excise, or the laws of trade and navigation, to seize such ships and vessels aforesaid, and in such places and in such manner, in which such the officers of his Majesty's customs or excise, and the officers of his Majesty's navy, are empowered respectively to make seizures under the laws of customs and excise, or under the laws of trade and navigation; and that every ship and vessel, with the tackle, apparel, and furniture, together with all the materials, arms, ammunition, and stores, which may belong to, or be on board of such ship or vessel, may be prosecuted and condemned in the like manner, and in such courts as ships or vessels may be prosecuted and condemned by any breach of the laws made for the protection of the revenues of customs and excise, or the laws of trade and navigation.

And it is, in and by the said act, further enacted, that if any person in any part of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or in any part of his Majesty's dominions beyond the seas, without the leave and license of his Majesty for that purpose first had and obtained as aforesaid, shall, by adding to the number of the guns of such vessel, or by changing those on board for other guns, or by the addition of any equipment for war, increase or augment, or procure to be increased or augmented, or shall be knowingly concerned in increasing or augmenting, the warlike force of any ship or vessel of war, or cruiser, or other armed vessel, which, at the time of her arrival in any part of the United Kingdom or any of his Majesty's dominions, was a ship of war, cruiser, or armed vessel, in the service of any foreign prince, state, or potentate, or of any person or persons exercising, or assuming to exercise, any powers of government in or over any colony, province, or part of any province or people, belonging to the subjects of any such prince, state or potentate, or to the inhabitants of any colony, province, or part of any province or country, under the control of any person or persons so exercising, or assuming to exercise, the powers of government, every such person so offending shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall, upon being convicted thereof, upon any information or indictment, be punished by fine and imprisonment, by either of them, at the discretion of the court before which such offender shall be convicted.

Now, in order that none of our subjects may unwarily render themselves liable to the penalties imposed by the said statute, we do hereby strictly command that no person or persons whatsoever, do commit any act, matter or thing whatsoever, contrary to the provisions of the said statute imposed, and of our high displeasure.

And we do hereby further warn and admonish all our loving subjects, and all persons whatsoever entitled to our protection, to observe towards each and all of the aforesaid sovereigns, their subjects, and territories, and towards all belligerents whatsoever, with whom we are at peace, the duties of neutrality; and to respect, in all and each of them, the exercise of those belligerent rights which we and our royal predecessors have always claimed to exercise.

And we do hereby further warn all our loving subjects, and all persons whatsoever entitled to our protection, that if any of them shall presume, in contempt of this our Royal proclamation, and of our high displeasure to do any acts in derogation of their duty as subjects of a neutral sovereign, in a war between other sovereigns, or in violation or contravention of the law of nations in that behalf, as more especially by breaking, or endeavoring to break, any blockade lawfully and actually established by or on behalf of any or either of the said sovereigns, by carrying officers, soldiers, despatches, arms, ammunition, military stores, or any article or articles considered and deemed to be, contraband of war, according to the law or modern usages of nations, for the use or service of any or either of the

said sovereigns, that all persons so offending, together with their ships and goods, will rightly incur, and be justly liable to, hostile capture, and to the penalties denounced by the law of nations in that behalf.

And we do hereby give notice, That all our subjects and persons entitled to our protection who may misconduct themselves in the premises, will do so at their peril, and of their own wrong; and that they will in no wise obtain any protection from us against such capture, or such penalties as aforesaid, but will, on the contrary, incur our high displeasure by such misconduct.

Given at our court at Buckingham Palace, this thirteenth day of May, in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and fifty nine, and in the twenty second year of our reign. God save the Queen!

OBITUARY.

Sister FANNY YOUNG, who died in G. S. L. City, June 11, 1859, aged 71 years, 7 months and 3 days, was born in Hoxkinton, Mass., on the 8th of November, 1787. She lived in her native town until the winter of 1801, when she removed with her parents, John and Nabby Young, to Whitingham, Vermont, where she remained till the winter of 1804, and moved thence to Sherburne, Chenango co., N.Y., where she resided nine years, and from there went to Cayuga co., in which she resided about seven years.

In 1832 she received the gospel, and moved to Ohio in the fall of 1833. From that date to the day of her death she has been with the body of the church, and arrived in G. S. L. City in the fall of 1850.

Sister Young was naturally of a devotional turn of mind, and from the beginning of her career in the gospel, as revealed through the Prophet Joseph Smith, her life and example gave abundant proof of her enduring and unshaken faith, in the full enjoyment of which she cheerfully met that power termed "King of Terrors," and her happy spirit now rejoices with the Saints in Paradise, where she fully realizes the words of the poet, in a favorite verse which she often repeated:

"Nor pain, nor grief, nor anxious fear
Invade thy bounds; no mortal woes
Can reach the peaceful sleeper here,
And angels guard her soft repose."
