Hainau's bloody butcheries at the close of the Hungarian revolt of 1849 are yet fresh in the memory; but General Gyulai, now leading the Austrian forces, bids fair to even exceed Hainau in cruelty. The following, says the remains uncontradicted, as the text of a proclamation by this bloody General to the inhabitants of Placenza, though it is commented upon with great severity by the press in other parts of Europe:
