The funeral services of Brother Reese Powell, who died last Sunday, were held yesterday at 2 o'clock at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. W. H. Watch, City. They will be conducted at the 15th Ward School-house to-morrow.

The ball at the 12th Ward School-house, last night was numerous attended. The concert in the same hall to-night is expected to be a grand success. The proceeds are to be given to a good purpose—the Sunday School fund.

Butterworth's bill, now before Congress, providing for the compulsory retirement of all army officers over 62 years of age, is a sweeping measure. It would place about 25,000 military men on the shelf, including General Sherman.

Senator Edmunds made a second effort to have his anti-politician bill considered to-day, but said he would not push the question of consideration until several Senators who had not yet returned to the Senate to-day had been heard from.

What may be termed a strange coincidence is the fact that the night after a keg of syrup mysteriously disappeared from a ranchman's wagon, a number of young people from Dillon enjoyed a candy pull at the residence of Mr. Phil. Thorpe. Mr. Thorpe respectfully requested them to return the keg.—Dillon (Montana) Tribune.

The war party of Indians who recently stole fourteen head of horses near Reed's Fort, was composed of two Featherheads and four warriors. They came to Al. Stevens' place at the Gap, dismounted and entered the saloon, and demanded whisky. When they were refused they drew their guns, cocked them and packed them. The proprietor's head combed him to give them what they wanted. The party visited Martinsdale and obnoxious whisky at Frank Geiger's store in the same way. The thieves, when last seen were going down the Musselshell. A lieutenant and a command of eleven soldiers and five Cheyenne, Indian scouts from Martinsdale were in pursuit, but the thieves with a start of five days made good their escape.—Bronx Record, 6th Ind.

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Willet's Bill.—In the Congressional House of Representatives to-day, Willet, from the committee on Judiciary reported a bill to prevent persons living in bigamy or polygamy from holding any civil office of trust or profit in any of the Territories of the United States, and from being delegates to Congress. It was placed on the House calendar.

THE HOGAN SUICIDE.

THE DECEASED WROTE A LETTER TO HIS WIFE, OF WHICH THE FOLLOWING IS A TRANSLATION.

Justice Thomas F. Fisher, of the South Precinct of Davis County, sends us the following particulars of the suicide of yesterday:

"As the justice of the peace who held the inquest on the body of the man, Paul Hogan, who committed suicide yesterday, in this south precinct, I thought you should be informed of the facts.

The first witness, Charles R. Harley, stated that about 11.30 a. m., yesterday, he was passing a point known as Ward's crossing, near the U. C. railway. He saw deceased lying by the side of the main road, on his back, with a pistol lying on his body. Supposing him to be a drunken man, he passed on. Afterward, Walter and Joseph Moore came upon the body and discovered life to be extinct. A pistol and a letter addressed to Bishop Wm. Brown, were lying by his side. They gave the information of the matter. The body proved to be that of Paul Hogan, a resident of this place, a man about 30 years of age, single, here, married and had one child. He bore a most excellent character, but was often affected with despondency. I send you a copy of the inquisition."

The following is a copy of the verdict:

TERMINUS OF UTAH, South Precinct of Davis County.

An inquisition taken at South Bountiful, on the 12th day of February, A. D. 1882, before Thomas F. Fisher, justice of the peace in South Precinct, upon the body of Paul Hogan, deceased, lying dead by the side of the U. C. R. R. He was found to be a man about 30 years of age, single, here, married and had one child. He bore a most excellent character, but was often affected with despondency. I send you a copy of the inquisition."

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Shooting Scrape at Silver Reef.

A shooting affair occurred here about 9 o'clock on Sunday night.

As Wm. Wyatt was approaching the entrance of a dance house, of which he is proprietor, he was accosted by Harry Mix, a professional locky, and after a brief squabble in regard to a money difficulty which existed between them, Wyatt drew a revolver and struck Mix on the head, knocking him down and inflicting a severe but not fatal wound. A third party, named Isaac Van Zant, a friend of Mix, then took a hand in the melee, and six or seven shots were exchanged between him and Wyatt. One of the balls struck the latter, penetrating the groin, about three inches to the right of the navel. He now lies in a critical condition and the case is considered hopeless. Van Zant was arrested.

At a Western trial the other day a witness who was being bullied by a drunken man, called on the court for protection. The judge kindly loaned the witness a revolver and the bullying ceased.
