SILVER DEFEATED!

The galleries of the House crowded
with interested spectators.

RATIO AMENDMENTS VOTED DOWN

The battle of the Battling—An
allegory of the Anti-slavery
Men.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 25.—The
galleries of the House were crowded
long before the time for assembling,
the persons interested in the result of
the balloting on the silver question
being two weeks' delay. When the
silver ramp for safety at once
nearly every seat in the hall was
filled. While waiting for a call to
order Blaine rose, somed what the
size of his adversary in a massive
tutu, and said: "It is well if the
Wilson bill might go through with
haste or no trouble."

act was read. Blaine offered his
first amendment to free coinage at a
ratio of 16 to 1.

members, the bill was voted down.
The anti-slavery members voted
against the bill.
