



LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

THEATRICAL.—Last night there was a very good house to witness the presentation of "Hamlet." Mr. Davenport's impersonation of the part was chaste and well embodied performance. His reading was very fine, and he made his points with much ability. Mrs. Davenport's Ophelia was good, and her mad scenes were well played. We have seen the tragedy before, but through Mr. McKenzie's performance, Mr. Graham's Laertes and Mr. Hardie's Hamlet were deserving of much commendation. The play was very well acted, and the other parts were played in a manner that materially spoiled the general effect of the performance. An audience can be made for such a play, but there is none for professionals, who do not like to see a play so well acted, and to do less in justice to the audience.
This evening Miss Jane will appear as Lady Macbeth and Macbeth's Wife, in "East Lynne." Mr. McKenzie playing Archibald and Miss Biddle making her second appearance as Barbara, in which character she will sing several songs. The parts are in good hands. In "East Lynne" there are some exceedingly powerful scenes, in which Miss Jane's unquestionably good qualities will find scope for their display. In the scene in which the agonized mother sees her child dying before her eyes, and dare not acknowledge her maternity, her most thrillingly acting.
Tomorrow night Mr. and Mrs. Davenport will give their last appearance at the Grand Opera House, when O'Keefe's comedy of "The World's End" will be presented for the first time. It is followed by the little comedy of "The Wedding."
PRELIMINARY returned last night from the States. He will start in the morning for Grantsville, accompanied by a number of elders.

THE LENO.—By a gentleman just in from Echo, we learn that the grading in the main cañon has been completed. In the North Fork of Echo cañon, W. Young, Esq., and Bishop Sheets, are pushing the work along with all possible energy. They are hiring men as fast as applications are made, and have employment for quite a number.
TOPOGRAPHICAL.—A genius intimates in the Montana Post that the "Mormons" are very anxious to have the railroad "come down Echo cañon instead of Weber cañon," so that it will come by Salt Lake City. That brilliant repository of topographical information is evidently well posted with regard to the whereabouts of all the cañons in this Territory. He must be second cousin to the man who said that Salt Lake was a large pond of warm and sultry water, situated in the centre of Salt Lake City. WASHED AWAY.—The Owyhee Avalanche of the bursting of a gigantic water spout in the vicinity of Humboldt Lake. A mile of the Central Pacific Railroad was washed away, but particulars are not given as to what other damage was done.
RAILROAD MATERIAL.—The U. P. R. R. is pushing along their work westward, and the track, as far as laid, bears on it, many hundreds of tons of materials used in construction. Nor is the Central moving slowly in this respect, for vessels are arriving at San Francisco, says the *Territorial Enterprise*, with immense quantities of material for the rail, spikes, car wheels and materials for cars, which is being brought over the mountains as rapidly as possible. We are not informed so frequently of the progress of the U. P. R. R. as we are of the U. T. R. R., but it is being pushed forward with great energy.
WHAT IS THE MATTER.—For some time past there seems to have been an alarming increase in the murders and suicides chronicled all over the country. It looks almost as if a suicidal and murderous epidemic had been raging. Every conceivable form of cruelty and barbarity has manifested itself. Now, a mother murdering her babe and killing herself in a manner too revolting to faithfully describe. Then, a father chopping off the hands and feet of his child. Another time, a father murders his family; a son killing his father; a young lady walking calmly down to a river side, plunging in, and drowning herself; and these conditions of things is horrible to contemplate. There is a wide field for missionary efforts.
SUPERIOR GRAPE.—Mr. T. W. Ellerbeck delighted us this morning with the presentation of a fine bunch of white grapes weighing about a pound. The berries are beautifully veined, resembling a Whitesmith gooseberry, and are covered with a rich light green bloom. In flavor they are most delicious and all that could be desired, and, thus early, are well ripened. Mr. Ellerbeck is remarkably good success with the finer fruit. He has one or two kinds that are best on very dry lands—pre-eminent among which is the White Frontignan, which is one of the finest grapes, but worthless when grown on wet soil. We have some thoughts of trying to plant a vineyard this fall, and if we do we shall take early opportunity to secure the vines of his early ripening varieties.
MUCH OBLIVION.—Pedestrians who have to walk eastward along South Temple street are much obliged to the gentlemanly Supervisor of Streets, for the promptness with which the foot bridges over the sewers have been repaired. In some parts of the town also, the foot bridges are "fixed up" and repaired, and walking is consequently improved. Again we say, much obliged.
