

# PROPERTY OWNERS ARE UP IN ARMS

Encroachment of Denver & Rio Grande Tracks on Sixth West Must be Stopped.

## PETITION TO CITY COUNCIL.

Liquor License Granted a Saloon Within 50 Feet of a Place of Amusement.

AMONG the matters to come before the meeting of the city council at its session this evening will be the consideration of E. C. Allen, a resident of the west side, who threatens the paper and members of the council with impeachment proceedings if they continue to longer ignore the petitions of the west side for redress against the encroaching of the Rio Grande railroad on Sixth West street. The letter follows:

Dear Mayor Bradford and City Council:

Dear Sirs and Gentlemen—This will be my last appeal to your honorable body. Personally representing property owners west of the Rio Grande tracks, I have asked for redress like that given south and southwest of Sixth West occupied by the Rio Grande, and as yet both and all of my demands of right, which fellow citizens have been ignored and trampled upon by the R. G. W.

My council and our honorable mayor, I again make my last request. On the 25th day of October, if nothing is done, there will be a suit filed in the courts against the R. G. W., asking that their franchise be revoked—with plenty of proof for violating the city ordinances.

Also, your council members and myself will be called up through the courts to show cause why their seats should not be vacated as to their oath of office. None of you have compelled the railroad to go with the railroads and have ignored respectable citizens and taxpayers and supporters of the office they now hold for the asking of a place to walk and be out of the mud.

Now our fall campaign is looking for a better Salt Lake. Let us hope it will be the aid of the courts, if possible.

Property owners in this district have been protesting to the council against the actions of the railroad company for more than a dozen years. The railroad, since it has been taking a little more of Sixth West street south of the tracks, has been trampling on the western sidewalk in some places. In spite of repeated protests of property owners, this has been allowed to go on by the city council, and the property owners of the district, headed by the president of the First Methodist church, have arrived at the limit of endurance and have so informed the council.

## PROTEST FROM THEATRE.

The protest of the manager of La Vieille Lune, and State street, against the granting by the council of a liquor license to Edleman & Gates, at 25 south STATE street, will also come up this evening. The council two weeks ago issued the license, in direct violation of the state law, which says no saloon may be allowed a license within 50 feet of a theater.

The manager of the theater followed the petition of the property owners of the district, and the manager of the theater protests against the issuance of the license.

The manager of the petitions for annexation to the city of those districts known as Waterloo and State, probably will be acted upon this evening. The petitions were up a week ago, but as no maps had been submitted by the petitioners, no action was taken. The annexation petitions with maps will probably be filed this evening, and the hearing of those favoring and opposing the annexation of the districts named will be heard.

A petition from William Hower and other property owners asks that Twenty-third East street, from South Temple to Fifth South, Second from Thirtieth East to the entrance of the university, and Fifth South from Thirtieth East to Mt. Olive cemetery be paved with asphalt.

The petitioners, judges not passed over last Thursday evening, will be considered and answered this evening. Your vacancies in the list remained to be filled after the adjourned session of the council was held Thursday evening, and these names will be ready for approval tonight.

## URGES Y.M.C.A. MEN TO GET INTO POLITICS

Atts. E. O. Lee Speaks on the "Duty of Young Men"—Special Music.

E. O. Lee, an attorney, spoke on the "Duty of Young Men" at the Y. M. C. A. Sunday afternoon. The meeting was well attended and a special musical program was rendered. Mr. Lee urged young men to take an intelligent part in the politics of their community. In his address Mr. Lee said:

### ORIGIN OF SYSTEM.

"The origin of this system of demarcation is traceable to the management of the Central Pacific Railroad company, who, without any regard to the character or ability of the candidates, placed on that ticket: perhaps you do not know anything about the personnel of the respective tickets put before you and from which you are to choose. Perhaps you will seek knowledge of the names of the men who are named as candidates for the respective offices, but if you do, your choice is not limited to the very few whose names are before you. They probably are all good men, but it is possible that some of them are men of your choice, who, under the present system it might be possible that each and all are wholly unfit for the office for which they are named. If that should happen, whose fault is it?

### WHERE FAULT LIES.

It is the fault of those good people who do not understand the primaries and who refrain from taking an interest in politics. Many of our good people decay—look upon it, as it is, as contempt—wash their hands of political matters, and say they will have nothing to do with politics—hold themselves aloof. It would not attend the primaries to do anything to remedy the evils, whether they are real or real, they so much decay again."

### ACCOMMODATION TO MERCHANT.

"However, they refused to relinquish the extra charge, which was still collected under the old system, as the railroads were perfectly willing to perform the service, and were only making direct delivery purely as an accommodation to the merchant.

"Forseeing the death of this excuse, another had to be created to take its place and later the water-carriage theory was invented. This vicious subterfuge has been used successfully for years to perpetuate this false fault, unless you have done what you could to have the candidates named on the ticket.

It is not dishonorable to engage in politics, as many would have you believe, or at least as many pretend to believe, but it is necessary to take an active and lively interest in your country, state and nation. Nay, it is your duty. It is every man's duty to do his best, though acquaint himself with the politics of his city and of his country, and then with an enlightened conscience, do as much as he can, manfully and honestly, to bring about what he deems is best.

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## THE IMPELLING MOTIVE.

The impelling motive is to so control the commercial situation as to force the merchants to produce to the remote ends of the earth for manufacture and to compete the merchant to purchase his wares at the most distant market centers so that the transportation companies can secure the highest bid in both directions.

It illustrates the system as it actually operates. Green hide can be shipped to the Pacific seaboard, approximately 500 miles westward, thence reshipped to Boston directly through the point of origin at a lower rate than if shipped direct to Boston. The hides are manufactured into shoes in Boston for shipment to the Pacific north.

"In turn, the shoes can be shipped through to the coast and returned to the interior at the same rate as delivered direct. The interior rate being the sum of the rate to the coast and back."

### TYPO CHIEF COMING.

President James M. Lynch of the International Typographical Union will be in the city Tuesday for a two days' sojourn.
