

**Strong Testimony Against the Accused Cashier During Today's Examination.**

### Banker Took an Interest in a Suicide Insurance Case—The Boys Testify.

The grand jury hearing of the Miami shooting case is developing interest and excitement as it proceeds, and furnishing interesting reading. It has been noted that the witness regarding the shooting occurred in some city of this city, Mr. Miami. During his testimony that extended from 7 o'clock yesterday afternoon until 11:30 this morning has shed some unexpected light on matters at the Utah National bank.
