**By Telegraph.****CONGRESSIONAL HOUSE.**

Schenck made a report from the committee of conference on the tax bill, which was agreed to and the bill passed with the House. Schenck explained all that portion of the bill relating to banks which had been stricken out. Special agents are limited to 625 in number. Mineral oil is put on the same footing as other manufactured oil. There is no tax per gallon on petroleum. Spirits in bond are required to be removed in nine months. The special tax on distillers remains as heretofore. The tax on the wholesale sales of liquor dealers will be one per cent. By the provisions relating to inspectors, sixteen or seventeen hundred officers will be got rid of, only about one hundred inspectors being left to inspect tobacco, snuff, cigars, etc. This will reduce revenue officers more than half. In reply to a question with reference to adjournment, Schenck said the principal business before the committee of ways and means was the funding bill, which had been referred to it to-day, upon which the committee would report back within eight hours. The Senate amendment to the House bill to create the office of Surveyor General of Utah was concurred in. A recess was taken till evening, for a general debate.

**GENERAL.**

New York.—The Times Richmond special says at the Democratic ratification meeting on Saturday night, Gov. Vance declared that what the Confederacy fought for would be won by the election of Seymour and Blair. Gov. Wise, while supporting the nominations, denounced as a falsehood the first Tammammy resolution, which alleged rebellion to be dead. He declared secession more alive than ever, and especially supported Blair because he had promised a revolution.

The cholera is decreasing in violence and extent.

Narva had succeeded in raising a mile of the new telegraph cable when the machinery lost its hold of the cable and it sunk to the bottom.

New Orleans, 13.—Warmouth, Governor elect, was inaugurated to-day in the House of Representatives in the presence of a large crowd. The oath was administered by the Chief Justice. The inaugural address was very brief and not explicit with regard to the future course of the administration.

New Orleans, 14.—Gov. Warmouth notified General Buchanan of his inauguration, whereupon the latter issued an order notifying all the military officers that the civil law is now supreme in La., and instructing the civil officers under military appointment to turn over their offices to their successors, who have been elected.

The Herald's Washington dispatch says that Chief Justice Chase has again declared himself in full sympathy with the Democratic party, although he disagrees with the plank of their platform relative to the southern constitutions. He believes they should stand till changed by the people of each State, all voting.

Washington.—Fifteen Radicals from Mississippi appeared before the reconstruction committee, to-day, demanding the exclusion of several counties from the count of votes, alleging that a reign of terror existed in Mississippi.

New York.—There were thirty-nine cases of sun stroke, twelve of them fatal, to-day.

Chicago.—The Democrats are holding an immense ratification meeting to-night; the court house square was densely packed, and the streets were filled with a long torch-light procession, numbering several thousands. The meeting was addressed by several distinguished speakers. Great jubilation was manifested.

Montgomery, 14.—The Legislature met yesterday. It contains thirty colored members. The Senate doorkeeper is colored; the House doorkeeper, sergeant-at-arms and chaplain are colored. Gov. Smith was inaugurated to-day; the message in the main, was quite conservative.

**FOREIGN.**

Mazatlan, 5.—The English steamer Chanticleer is still blockading the port against Mexican commerce, not interfering with American vessels. The United States steamer Resaca is in the port. The United States steamer Ossipee is at Corinto.
