

# CHAMPIONSHIP WRESTLING MATCH

Paul Pon and Ernest Roeder Agree  
to Meet.

## STRANGLE HOLD IS BARRED

Match to Take Place About January  
1st—Graco-Roman Style, Two  
Out of Three.

New York, Dec. 15.—Preliminary arrangements have been made for a world's championship Graco-Roman wrestling match between Ernest Roeder and Paul Pon, the French champion. There will be another meeting Monday when articles of agreement will be signed and forfeits posted. The men have practically agreed upon the following conditions:

The match to take place on or about January 1 in Madison Square Garden in Graco-Roman style, two falls in three for the world's championship. The strangle hold will be barred. The men will wrestle for a percentage of the gate receipts, and a side wager. The details will be agreed on at Monday's meeting.

## RACE ALMOST ENDED.

Riders Going at the Rate of Eighteen Miles an Hour.

New York, Dec. 15.—The six weary six-day riders, counting for fame and money, kept grinding out mile after mile during the day and evening at the rate of about eighteen miles an hour, and at midnight the leaders had covered 2,344 miles and seven laps, with the third team just one lap behind.

All the contestants in the big race are reported to be in such shape as will insure their continuing to the finish at 10 o'clock tonight.

Madison Square Garden was taxed to its utmost capacity last night, the spectators rising in their seats and cheering madly when any of the riders made an effort to force ahead.

The leading teams in the race, Elkes and MacFarland and Pierce and McEachern are always on the alert to catch the others napping then to shoot down from the high bank on either side of the garden in a frantic effort to gain the coveted lap that would probably settle the affair. McEachern got a good start on the bunch at 8 o'clock last night, but Elkes was not far behind him and MacEachern and to come back to the others, after setting a merry clip for a few minutes.

The feature of yesterday's riding was the performance of Elkes, the seemingly tireless partner of Rysse who at 6 o'clock yesterday morning, in a marvelous burst of speed, stole a clear lap on the racers and repeated the performance shortly after 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon. This time, however, having to circle the track over twenty times or two miles, before he caught up with the bunch.

During last evening Major Taylor established a new indoor world's record for one-quarter mile, unopposed, making the distance in 25.4 seconds.

At the end of the fifth day, the six-day riders were fifty-two miles behind record made by Waller and Miller last year.

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## CHAOS IN BASEBALL.

The National League Meeting Is at an End.

New York, Dec. 14.—The National League magnates have completed the annual winter meeting and by midnight tonight the majority of them had left New York for their homes. The magnates spent five days in the city, fighting out certain matters, but their success has been far from flattering. The chaos that existed in baseball before the annual winter session was begun still exists. The chances of another baseball war are just as good as they were on Monday last. The olive branch has been held out neither to the Players' Protective Association nor to the Johnson's American League. Instead, defiance has been offered.

During the meeting the magnates accomplished the following results:

Turned down the Players' Protective Association flatly by refusing the players a rehearing of their demands.

Decided upon a 140-game schedule for next year.

Decided that the schedule should be so arranged that the eastern clubs will finish the season in the west this year.

Reached an agreement by which no player shall carry more than sixteen players during the season after May 15.

Awarded the franchises to St. Paul, Minneapolis and Kansas City to the Western League.

As soon as the league had adjourned the new national league of arbitration went into session and listened to the application of W. T. Hickey, George Tobenau and C. J. Beall, representing the Western League. They asked for the territory recently abandoned by the American League, viz. St. Paul, Minneapolis and Kansas City. They also asked to be placed in class A, which puts them on a footing with the eastern leagues. The Western League will now be composed of eight cities. Besides the ones awarded tonight, the circuit will include St. Joseph, Denver, Des Moines, Sioux City or Pueblo and Omaha.

## Rainbow Laid Aside.

Bristol, R. I., Dec. 15.—The "Rainbow," Cornelius Vanderbuilt's 70-foot yacht, which has been undergoing extensive repairs at the Herreshoff shop, has been put overboard in order to make room for the work of running the keel of the new defender.

## Second Day of Golf.

Atlantic City, N. J., Dec. 14.—Play in the second day of the fall golf tournament of the Atlantic City Country club was resumed today on the Northfield links, with the first match play rounds.

## Pan-American Sports.

New York, Dec. 15.—James E. Sullivan, manager of the Pan American exhibition sports has returned from Buffalo, where he has had a conference with Jesse C. Dunn, chairman of the sports committee of the Pan-American exhibition. They agreed on a temporary program comprising sports to take place nearly every day of the exposition from May 15th to November 1st.

The program agreed upon will have to be submitted to the committee on sports who will hold a meeting soon. Then it will be transmitted to the governing bodies throughout the country for their approval.

## Faster Than Columbia.

Boston, Dec. 15.—There is more or less speculation among local yachtsmen on the probable speed of the big yacht that Crowninshield will design for a cup defender, based on a statement credited to him that he would expect to be five minutes faster than the Columbia over the course in an average breeze. It is understood that the designer has had a full set of the working plans of the Columbia for a long time and is therefore qualified to make a prediction. Mr. Crowninshield is making the defender's plans at his own residence and will deliver the frame plan to Mr. Lawley possibly next Monday. The lead keel, however, is expected to be in shape by January. In laying down the yacht the mould loft at Lawley's will be used and from there the work can be changed either to the boatshed or, if it should so happen to the Atlantic Yacht yards, in East Boston, although this latter course may be as an expediency.

It is quite definitely learned that Capt. Watson has nothing to hinder his acceptance of an offer to sail the boat.
