

# TROOPS WILL BE SENT TO CUBA

U. S. Forces Probably Will be Landed in the Island as Precautionary Measure.

## LENGTH OF INTERVENTION

Very Indefinite—Sufficient Force Will Be Maintained to Uphold the Provisional Government.

Washington, Sept. 30.—American troops now are moving toward Cuba. Mobilization of the forces will be at Newport News, Va., for the most part, although a part of the expeditionary force to Cuba will be sent from New York and Tampa, Fla. Advice received at the departments of the military today indicate that all is quiet in Cuba and that the insurgents intend to lay down their arms. The probability is the United States forces in the island will be landed only as a precautionary measure. So far as officials are advised no trouble of a serious kind is anticipated, but in accordance with instructions from President Roosevelt hurried preparations are being made for the sending of an expeditionary force of the army of Cuba.

The first American troops will be landed at Havana on Saturday. Meanwhile, the American fleet in Cuban waters will protect American interests and support Secy. Taft, the provisional governor of Cuba, in the prosecution of order and the protection of life and property.

In official circles here American intervention was regarded as an inevitable long delay may continue. It is impossible for the United States to maintain a supervision of Cuban affairs until the end of the year. Arrangements have been concluded not only for the expeditionary force to Cuba of about 100 men, but for a second force of equal numbers. No orders for the mobilization of the second force, of course, have been issued, but if the men are needed all arrangements have been completed for hurrying them to Cuba, the earliest possible moment. Which of the more troops than are included in the expedition will be sent to Cuba will depend upon the developments in the island during the next 10 days. The United States will maintain a sufficient force of American troops to support the provisional government and to insure security to life and property pending the establishment of a stable government by the Cubans.

Operations in all departments of the military establishment of the government today were on a war basis. The going secretaries and chiefs of bureau were at their desks and every office was humming with activity. Scores of desks which have not worked on Sunday since the Spanish-American war were on duty at the war and navy departments and at the headquarters of the marine corps.

Gen. Amersforth, military secretary, and Gen. Bell, chief of staff, of the army, worked throughout the day, concluding arrangements for the departure of the expeditionary force of Cuba. It is certain, however, that a sufficient force of American troops will be sent to Cuba to support the provisional government and to insure security to life and property pending the establishment of a stable government by the Cubans.

Gen. Humphrey, quartermaster general, practically closed arrangements today for transports which are to convey the expedition to Cuba. The ships will be ready for departure before the troops are mobilized at Newport News. It is not necessary to send a second expeditionary force to Cuba immediately following the first, the war department apprehends no difficulty in the movement of the expeditionary force to any southern state from the five days before it can take on a cargo of troops for Cuba. The war department has taken up this matter with the authorities of the southern states in the hope of arranging for a waiver of the five-day quarantine regulation.

Secy. Taft, as the head of the president's special mission of Cuba, has available nearly 5,000 marines and blue-jackets, who could be landed on Cuban soil in a few hours in case of emergency. Other marines are en route to Cuba, and will be available for emergency service in two or three days.

No time is being lost in hurrying troops to the point of mobilization—Newport News, Va. The order of President Roosevelt, received at 10:55 o'clock last night at the war department, was imperative. Its text was as follows:

"Arrange for 5,000 troops to start for Cuba as soon as possible."

This telegram was received in answer to one sent yesterday morning by the war department officials, following the message from Secy. Taft. Immediately upon receipt of the president's orders, telegrams were sent to the troops selected for Cuban service to move at once. By midnight last night all orders to troops had been dispatched, and advice received today by the military secretary, Gen. Ainsworth, indicate that the orders are being carried into effect.

Nine hundred men will sail from New York next Wednesday on the army transport Sumner. One light battery from Fort Sheridan, Ill., will embark from Port Tampa for Havana as soon as arrangements can be completed for the movement. The remainder of the first expeditionary force, which will number about 2,100 men, will sail for Cuba from Newport News, Va.

The troops to go to Cuba are battalions of infantry from Plattsburg (N. Y.) barracks, the president's engineers from Washington barracks. Accompanying them will be some officers and men of the medical corps and hospital corps and signal corps.

The Sumner is loading at New York. She will carry commissary supplies for the first expedition for 30 days, in addition to the necessary supplies for her crew and the men she will carry to Cuba. As soon as the troops are landed, which will be within 10 days, another full supply of commissary stores for 30 days will be sent to Cuba by a merchant liner. One week later a third supply for 30 days will be forwarded to Cuba. The object of sending the supplies so rapidly is to get them into the depots at Havana and have them handled without confusion.

Maj. Harry E. Wilkins, now assistant to Lieut.-Col. A. D. Kriskien, the purchasing commissary at Chicago, has been ordered to Cuba as the chief commissary of the expedition. He already has started from Chicago for Havana. Capt. Henry G. Cole of the commissary general's office here has started for Cuba with a force of clerks. Tomorrow will sail from Tampa, Fla., tomorrow night for Havana, Capt. Francis J. Koester, commissary at the Washington barracks, will leave tomorrow for Newport News to superintend the loading of supplies on the transports which are to sail from that port and to provide for the subsistence of the troops at Newport News before their embarkation.

Capt. Leo P. Foster of the commissary general's office, will be the assistant to the chief commissary at Havana. He probably will sail for Cuba on the transport Sumner next Wednesday.

A dispatch was received at the war department today from Brig.-Gen. Theodore J. Wint, commanding the department of the Missouri, that he would arrive here Tuesday. He will be in command of the troops at Newport News, as they mobilize there and will direct their embarkation for Cuba. Two companies of coast artillery will be ordered to Newport News to act as provost guard.

Capt. Frank McIntyre, acting chief of the bureau of insular affairs, accompanied by Maj. J. R. Keane of the medical corps of the army, will leave Washington tomorrow for Havana. They will sail for Miami, Fla., Tuesday night. Some cases of yellow fever have developed in Havana, and Secy. Taft is concerned lest the disease be carried to the troops which are to be assembled there.

BP. WILLIAMS SAYS BIBLE NOT THE WORD OF GOD.

Detroit, Mich., Sept. 30.—Bishop Charles B. Williams of the Episcopal diocese of Michigan, in an address to Y. M. C. A. members here today on "The Bible and the Word of God," declared that the Bible was not the word of God, and that the teachings to the contrary are the most prolific source of unbelief the church has to contend with.

The bishop said: "Nowhere does the Bible declare itself the word of God. Yet we are told to take it in its entirety. It is a venerable book, and visitors are requested not to touch it. As it is the direct word of God, there is no other. 'Take the young man just out of college. He reads Genesis and finds impossible geology, astronomy and ethnology. His teacher, when questioned, says: 'Manipulate it until it fits your sciences.' If you honest to handle the word of God truthfully, the young man gives up the Bible. He refuses to stultify his reason."

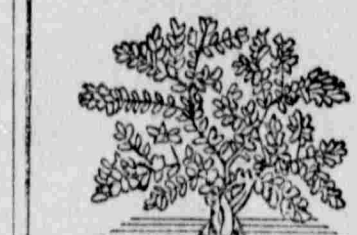

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# RUSSIA'S NEW LAND POLICY

Machinery Set in Motion for Distribution of Land to The Peasantry.

## ABOUT TWO DOLLARS AN ACRE

Payments Spread Over Fifty Years—Voluntaneous Regulations to Guide Agrarian Commissions.

St. Petersburg, Sept. 30.—The final step to set in action the machinery of the government's plan for the distribution of land to the peasantry was taken today by the publication of voluntaneous regulations to the local agrarian commissions, under which the sale of 11,000,000 desiatines of land in European Russia will begin immediately. These commissions, which are composed of delegates elected by the peasants, the landowners and the zemstvo, and of representatives of the government, acts as intermediaries in the valuation of the land and the fixing of conditions of sale. They are charged with arrangements for emigration also. The acreage in eastern Russia and on the Siberian steppes surrendered by the emperor will be sold on easy terms. The price is less than \$2 an acre, and payments are spread over 50 years.

With the Constitutional Democratic congress only one week away and the formation of a formidable new party on Count Heyden's platform, peaceful and moderate in its aims, the political campaign is becoming animated. The ban upon the meetings of the Constitutional Democrats in St. Petersburg and Moscow has been removed, and those who have been sanctioned, subject to the restrictions of ex-Premier Witte's temporary law.

Encouraged by this concession, the Constitutional Democrats contemplated transferring their congress of Oct. 5 from Helsinki to St. Petersburg, but they will adhere to the arrangements made to meet in the Finnish capital unless the government definitely assured of non-interference, as they are in whole some fear of the regulations of "reformed security." It is expected that about 400 delegates will attend the congress.

The appeal for mitigation of the death sentence passed upon the assassin of Gen. Kozlov, who was killed in Petrohof park last July, has been joined by the general's widow. After fruitless intercession with the commander of the St. Petersburg garrison, Mrs. Kozlov has telegraphed the emperor, asking that no further blood be shed upon the tomb of her husband.

ESTATES PILLAGED. Vyazniki, Vladimir Province, Russia, Sept. 30.—Agrarian disorders have broken out here, and a number of estates have been pillaged.

GERMAN SOCIAL DEMOCRATS. Mannheim, Germany, Sept. 30.—The Social Democratic party re-elected Herr Bebel and Singer to be members of the managing committee of the party, and adjourned to meet at Essen in 1907.

Herr Bebel's mastery of the Socialist party seems to be unshaken. His attitude toward the party policies drawn out of neglect for never less than four-fifths of the delegates, and usually nine-tenths. Bebel and his associates in the managing committee are devoting themselves to working out plans for the next general election in 1908. The campaign fund, it is said, already amounts to \$30,000. The aim of the party chiefs is to increase the Socialist vote from 3,000,000, the total in the reichstag elections of 1903, to 3,500,000, or possibly 3,750,000, in the elections of 1908.
