Seven Knights of the Road Rob As Many Railroaders of Money And Valuables.

# **RESIDENCE BURNED AT HOOPER.**

funtsville City Officers Will be Sworn In Friday-Officer After Iowa Embezzler.

Ogden has had her share of the holdups during the past few weeks, but none of them have been so daring as one committed at 9:15 Saturday night in the Southern Pacific yards, when seven employes of the Southern Pacific were held up and robbed of their money and valuables by seven robbers with "gly pistols.

Those held up were: Thomas Hanley, L. A. Kennedy, W. W. Williamsen, Charles Pettingill, John Hamaday, Joreph Derby, and one other. The men came in from the Lucin cut-off with came in from the Euclid cutoff with the train arriving shortly after b o'clock. They had only gone a short distance from the train when sudden-ly the command to hold up their hands was sounded in their ears. The comwas sounded in their ears. The com-mand was enforced by the holdups, four of whom had two guns each and the other three one gun each. The men were marched over to the rear of a nearby warehouse, where they were made to face the wall with hands point-der skyward and three of the holdure

made to face the wall with hands point-ing skyward and three of the holdups went through their pockets while the others held the pistols. Mr. Hanley was the greatest looser as \$41.50 and a \$60 gold watch were taken from him. Three of the other men lost watches and small sums of money. Mr. Pettingill, through careful actions, removed his watch from his pocket and placed it in his hat there-by saving it.

y saving it. The robbers after searching each one lined them up in single file and march-ed them to a box car some distance away and forced them to enter. They Then locked the car door and escaped. The men were unable to get out of the car and give the alarm for nearly an hour; by that time the holdups had dispersed and none of them have as yet been located. The robbers wore hand-kerchiefs over the lower part of their faces, hence it would be difficult to identify them. The police and sheriff departments have both been working on the affair.

# STATION AGENT SUICIDES.

### C. H. Barnes, Brooding Over Death of His Wife, Takes His Own Life.

Sevier, Sevier Co., Oct. 10.--C. H. Barnes, a young man of 35, who came here from Kincald, Kansas, only four days ago, to act as station agent on the Rio Grande Western, committed suicide by shooting at about 12 o'clock today.
