OPENING UP LIME QUARRIES.

Difficulty of Getting an Article Suitable for Sugar Making Purposes. Special Correspondence.

Lehi, Utah Co., Feb. 3.-Ever since the Utah Sugar company has been in operation prospectors have traversed almost every mountain and hill of this locality in search of suitable lime rock for the manufacture of sugar, but up to this time no rock has been discov-ered that equals the Utah Sugar company's own quarry, containing so lit-tle silica and magnesia. The less of these two these two elements, carried by the imestone, the better it is for sugar making making purposes. Some time ago Messrs. Ell Kimball, Otto Hudson and Peter Adams located two quarries at the Twelve Mile Pass in Rush valley, which they claim is an excellent rock. and up to this date have shipped a few carloads to the smelters of Salt Lake valley, and Mr. Hudson stated that 10 teams had left this morning for the quarries, and that the company expect-ed to increase the shipments very ma-terially within a short time. Messrs, C. W. Earl, B. C. Earl, J. P. Dyring and W. S. Evans of this place have located a quarry at the mouth of American Fork canyon samples of which have been analyzed by the chemist of the Utah Sugar company, but this stone carries too much magnesia for sugar making purposes, yet it is thought as they go into the mountain the per-centage of magnesia will lessen and it perhaps could be used in the manufac-ture of sugar. In conversation with Mr. C. W. Earl this morning he states that they are negotiating with the American Smelter and Refining com-pany of Murray, Utah, to bond the quarry to this company, and that the papers will be signed within the next

# BETTER THAN A BONANZA MINE

Senator A. B. Lewis' Artesian Well Flowing 72,000 Gallons per Day.

Milford, Beaver Co., Jan. 31 .-- The opening up of a great bonanza mine would be of no more importance to Milford than the success of the artesian well that has ben sunk by Senator A. Lewis on his 30-acre tract of land adjoining the town on the east, says the Times. The well is now flowing at the rate of 72,000 gallons every 24 hours, enough to supply the need of a much larger town than Milford, and the expert who bored the well expresses the

pinion that the flow can be doubled. It is the purest and finest water in the world and there is no longer any ques-tion that Milford possesses a water sup-ply sufficient to meet all of the needs of a large city and conduct important manufacturing and irrigation enter-

prises as well. The first flow was encountered by the six inch pipe in a stratum of sand at a depth of 267 feet. This produced sixteen gallons per minue. The well was continued down with a four and iah Tuttle, laid down the cares of a a half inch casing and at a depth of long and useful life, respected and 450 feet the second stratum of sand was Deceased was born in Yorkshire, Eng-land, Dec. 2, 1821, and came to America with her parents while vet ceived instructions from Senator Lewis to continue down with a 2-inch pipe and is confident that at a depth of and is confident that at a depth of about 500 feet he will encounter a third stratum that will produce a heavier flow than both of the others combined. There was great jubliation in Milford when it became known that the water problem was solved and Senator Lewis received warm praise for his enterprise in demonstrating the artesian well possibilities of this section. It is under-stood to be his intention to cut the 80acre tract up into city lots and pipe the water to every lot. The cost of the well complete, as it stands now, was \$1,140. Two more artesian wells are to be driven down just as quickly as Mr. Halterman can do the work, one by Sen-ator Lewis at or near the smelter, and

the other by John Forgie on his city The success of Senator Lewis' well

has revived the talk of a waterworks system for Milford. The plan proposed s to draive an artesian well down on the flat and pump the water by gasolit power into a large reservoir located upon the west bench, whence it could be piped under good pressure to very part of town. It would afford spien VOTY did protection in case of fire and artesian water piped into the houses would be an advantage that but few

towns could boast. It is estimated that such a system would cost \$6,000 or \$7,000. But it is in the way of irrigation that the artesian water supply promises greatest results. There are thous-ands upon thousands of acres of the most fertile land in the world located about Milford and it is now demonstrated that this land can be irrigated with artesian wells and storage reservoirs. This land is capable of supportng a population of thousands and its cultivation means a populous city at this point. Those who pretend to know

declare that this one well is producing enough water now to irrigate 40 acres of land. But little irrigation is needed in this valley and good crops can be grown with two waterings.

MILFORD'S FIRST CHURCH.

Just north of the opera house, the Latter-day Saints have purchased a lot as a site for a \$1,000 chapel, which will be erected at once. It will be Milford's first church and it is proposed to make it as neat and commodious a structure as possible. At the coroner's inquest Dr. Pearson was called to examine him, and gave it as his opinion that the deceased came to his death through heart failure brought on by strong drink. The doctor could not find any bruise or wound of any kind on Welsh's head, and he did not think the blow with the bottle had anydo with his death.
