

TERRITORIAL ITEMS.

THE SOUTHERN MILLS OF PROVO are completely packed with wheat and the owners refuse to receive any more on storage, for the simple reason that they have no room for any more. A number of persons, including merchants, are consequently under the necessity of putting up bins of their own.

The already immense number of newspapers in the Territory is increasing; its last budding number is the *Star Valley Echo*. It may have a severe time of existence and the good folks of Mantu are stirring in the journalistic arena and promise to increase our news centers by publishing the *Mantu City Times*.

The Sanpete Valley Railway, says a correspondent to the *Provo Enquirer*, has come to a dead stop, beyond about some miles of grade are made, seriously, inconspicuously the farmer through whose land this grade lies and the prospect of pay therefor is dimly in the future. A few minutes afterward, however, while Mrs. Margaret Dusenberry was outside the house only a few feet from the door, she heard one of the children cry out: "My grandmother is dying." She rushed back into the house and found the old lady breathing her last. Mayor Dusenberry and Judge Dusenberry were immediately sent for, but they arrived too late—all was over. There is no question in the minds of the family that the lady died of paralysis of the heart. The funeral services were held on Monday morning in the meeting house. President Cliff, President John, Bishop Booth and Bishop Johnson addressed the congregation on the life and character of the deceased, and testified to their personal knowledge of her excellent qualities, and her fidelity to the cause of truth.
