BREVITIES.

 The Revue Nationale publishes an article by Leroy Beaulieu, containing a number of terrible statistics taken from official documents. One gives the return of the number of men killed in action in the wars during the last four centuries: Crusades, 784,961; Italy, 45,000; Schleswig-Holstein, 3,500; North America, 281,000; South America, 519,000; war of 1869, 45,000; distant expeditions, 65,000—total number of men killed, 1,743,401.
 The London mint does not do much business now. Not a single sovereign was coined there last year, nor has one been struck there during this. During nearly fifteen months in fact, not a pound sterling in gold has been added to the currency of the Kingdom. Any one taking gold to the Mint can have it made into sovereigns, and the country bears the whole expense of the coinage.
 The very last private application which was made to the Mint came from Mr. Paddy, the American millionaire, who sent about \$10,000 of old gold of all kinds to be made into sovereigns.
