The Times publishes a dispatch from Seoul, dated March 11, in which the correspondent confirms previous re-ports that it is the intention of Japan to wait until the ice breaks up before making large disembarkations, in order to avoid difficulties on the roads. A REFUGEE'S STORY.

Tien Tsin, March 13 .-- A Russian refugee, who arrived here today, throws valuable additional light on the bombardment of Port Arthur last Thursday. He says that the stlack was intended for the forts, but the Japan-ese fire over-reached. There was small destruction, and the casualties were not destruction, and the casualities were not numerous. Twenty soldiers and two civilians were killed and three civilians injured. Col. Vershinin, governor of Port Arthur, was slightly wounded. The Japanese used 300 or 400 Russian shells, which they found on the captured transport Manchurla.

transport Manchuria. The refugee mentioned above says only four Japanese cruisors were ac-tively engaged. The forts replied with several shots whenever the Japanes left the cover of the Lao Thie Shan promontory. Besides the Retvisan, the battleship Ptaropavlovsk received witcht damage from a shot

battleship Ftaropavlovsk received slight damage from a shot. The action of Vice Admiral Maka-roff on the armored cruiser Novik in taking a portion of the fleet out of the harbor on Friday morning appealed to the patriotism and excited the admira-tion of the sartisen tion of the garrison.

The food supply of Port Arthur is re-ported to be about normal, though it is necessary to govern prices by ordi-nance. Three merchants have been punished for raising prices. The French caviare restaurants and the Russian cafe chatant are running, and the naval band plays in the park daily.

Replying to the inquiry of the com-mander of a foreign gunboat at New-chwang, the civil administrator charac-terizes the report of Russia's intention to block the Liao river by sinking junks as calumnies.

as calumnies. The latest report from Feng Huan Cheng, brought by a courier of the reg-ular native courier service, who left that place on March 8, states that there were no Japanese there, or in that vi-cinity. Therefore, the reports of en-counters at the outposts there must be discredited.

Oregon Pioneer Suicides.

Haywards, Cal., March 13 .- With no other known reason for taking his life but the fact that his wife was lying ill in a San Francisco hospital, Michael Hartery, a wealthy rancher of Castro Hartery, a wealthy rancher of Castro valley, near this place, took a dose of poison last night and died some time before midnight. He was found dead in his bed at 12 o'clock with an empty glass beside him which is supposed to have contained strychnine and whisky. Hartley was a pioneer of southern Oregon. He settled in that country many years ago and engaged extensive-ly in the cattle business. He came here about one year ago.

During the six months preceding the outbreak, Mr. Kurino concluded, diplo-mats had been forced to a second place in the negotiations, in which the mili-tary element had predominated.

KUROPATKIN IN MOSCOW.

Moscow, March 13.—The day Gen. Kuropatkin spent here was marked by demonstrations rivaling those of St. Petersburg. Immediately upon arriving he went to the Sergius monastery, where he attended a Te Deum. After this service he was conducted to the abbott's cell, where he was blessed with the ancient thon of Sergius. The with the ancient itson of Sergius. The numerous bells of the monastery and the churches pealed out as he drove away. Returning to Moscow, the gen-eral proseeded to the governor's palace, where he spent several hours in receiv-ing deputations of peasants, merchants and nobles, as well as the city elders, who were headed by the senior elder of all Russia.

all Russia. From the palace the general was driven to the nobles' assembly rooms, where he replied to the greeting of Prince Troubetzkoy, who expressed the universal confidence in Gen. Kuropat-

universal confidence in Gen. Kuropat-kin's leadership. Gen. Kuropatkin said. "Russia has outlived trials many times heavier than those which have now fallen to her lot, and ever issued victorious. Without belittling the difficulties which confronts us, or the strength and worth of our foes, we can again confidently await the victorious ter-mination of a fight which was not be-sun by us.

mination of a fight which was not be-gun by us. "A mighty host has been already as-sembled in the far east by the emper-or's order, but if this does not suffice, the emperor will send out fresh forces. "The prayers of Moscow and the prayers of Russia will maintain us and give us strength to stand up for Rus-sia's interests in the far east. We will not spare life or health in the service of the emperor and the country. "Representatives of Moscow, accept the most humble thanks of the Man-churian army for your greetings and

churian army for your greetings and prayers.
