They did not come to these valleys simply to better their temporal condition. But to be Saints, to grapple with evil, conquer and overcome, and then, by example as well as precept, seek to save others in like manner. They must seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness and all other things will be added.

The speaker was glad there were some in this Stake who held the things of God first in their thoughts, and manifested their faith by their works and their presence today. All that we acquire here, of truth and the knowledge of God, will rise with us in the resurrection. The secrets of the resurrection were locked up in the bosoms of those who have ex-perienced it, but some day we would know them for ourselves and would find they were natural principles.

We must take this world as we find it. Men and nations have their agency, the privilege of doing right or wrong. God would give them the opportunity to prove themselves. When a wicked nation had filled up its cup of iniquity it would fall, just as an individual would; God is over all. Satan may seem to have his own way, but the Lord is above him, and is working out His own will; His work will triumph and the wisdom of His plans will be made manifest. The speaker dlosed by exhorting the Priesthood especially the Bishops and Teachers-to diligence and faithfuluess in all their duties.
