TABERNACLE.—Yesterday the meetings at the Tabernacle were of a more than usually varied character.

At the close of the remarks of Mr. Andrews Mr. Levi M. Solinger, a member of the Dankard persuasion, late of Monmouth, Ill., and formerly from Pennsylvania, spoke for a few moments.

The services of the morning were closed by President Young, who, in a few words, exhorted the people to believe and trust in the Redeemer and the atonement He has effected.

The Rev. W. H. Solinger again asked permission to speak for a few moments, and occupied the time in exhorting outsiders, or as he called them "gentiles" and others to tell the truth about the people of Utah, and when they go from here to talk about the good they have done and are doing, and not to contradict themselves together to the idle stories and evil rumors that they pick up at the street corners.
