fortunes made in that section out of cedar. Cedar trees there are culti-vated as is any other crop. The groves, conserved as they are now by the wise owners, will last forever and will be furnishing the close grained, fine fibered wood for pencils a century from now."

BOSTON. Boston, Aug. 3.-Heavy dealings are reported in the local wool market with prices well maintained. The largest movements have been in territory staple. Dealers are extremely busy opening new lots from the west. Fine territory staple is selling at 75 to 75 cents; scoured and half-blood Mon-tana from 25 to 30 cents in the grease. Ohio fleece have been fairly active at 35 cents for half-blood and at 35 to 34 cents for one-quarter-blood unwashed. Texas and California wools figure in the activities while the market in pulled wool, and the foreign product keeps pace with the domestic.



CHICAGO. Chicago, Aug. 2.-Unexpected firmness in the wheat market at Liverpool im-parted moderate strength to the mar-ket here at the opening today. Initial quotations being unchanged to % high-er. But early in the session a promi-nent cash concern began to sell freely and this caused a slump of nearly 1c. September declining for 1.03% after opening at 1.05% to 1.04%. Weather in the northwest was generally favorable for the new crop. Increased offerings in the southwest and a slack cash demand here had a weakening effect on the corn market. September decling by country houses caused a further decline in the prices of oats. Opening prices were ½ higher to 4.0% lower. September being at 37 to 374. Later it sold off to 38% 637. Provisions were weak owing to a less builish showing than generally expected on the monthly statement of stocks in store. Prices at the opening were un-changed to 22½ lower. What-The market was weak all day. In the final half prices declined another cent on stop loss selling inspired by heaviness of northwestern markets. The close was weak with September down 1/4 at 1.02%. Corn-Exetreme weakness prevailed all day due partly to a sharr decline in cash grain. The market closed weak
