WARHINGTON, 1. — Secretary Sherman, in answering questions before the banking and currency committee said the amount of frac-tional currency applied to the bank-ing fund in 1876 was \$2,000,000; in 1877 it was \$14,000,000, and up to date 3.1-3 millions, a total of \$34,-500,000. Last year the deficit in the sinking fund was \$9,250,000, simply on account of the lack of revenue to make it good, however, on the whole, the fund has been more than made good.
